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INTRODUCTION

The ninth financing phase of the European Union started in January 2021 and will last until 2027. This EU's long-term budget, together with the NextGenerationEU recovery instrument, amounts to € 2.018 trillion in current prices (€1.8 trillion in 2018 prices). This unprecedented response will help repair the economic and social damage caused by the coronavirus pandemic and support the transition to a modern and more sustainable Europe. The budget is managed through more than 350 financial instruments and consists of the Multiannual Financial Framework 2021-2027, of € 1.211 trillion in current prices (€ 1.074 trillion in 2018 prices), combined with the temporary recovery instrument, NextGenerationEU, of € 806.9 billion (€ 750 billion in 2018 prices).

complex and daunting. Accessing information can be time consuming and difficult. This is especially true if you are not familiar with the structures.

The structures of EU funding can already seem complex, and the COVID-19 pandemic has presented the European Union with unprecedented challenges.

This guide aims to help organisations understand and access the main funding opportunities. EuroVienna compiled the document as support for the embedding and monitoring activities of EUSDR, based on EuroAccess (www.euro-access.eu), a free online search tool provided by EuroVienna. The guide starts with a short introduction to the Multiannual Financial Framework (MFF) 2021-2027. Each programme is then described in detail over two to three pages. These pages provide general information such as the funding region, eligible institutions, thematic priorities and details on project partnerships. In addition, there is a link to the corresponding page on EuroAccess, which provides further information and details on how to apply for a project.

MULTIANNUAL FINANCIAL FRAMEWORK 2021-2027

The EU adopted the Multiannual Financial Framework (MFF) and the EU's supplementary recovery programme in December 2020. The MFF sets the priorities for EU financial planning, determining how much the EU will invest in what areas over a seven-year period. It reflects political priorities, not the entire EU budget.

During the planning of the EU budget, experts assumed that no more than €950 billion would be available for the 2021-2027 EU budget phase due to Brexit and the associated loss of one of the largest net contributors to the EU budget. However, between the end of May and mid-June 2018, the European Commission exceeded this mark for the first time by publishing its first proposals for funding programmes for the 2021-2027 multiannual period, proposing a budget of more than €1 trillion. In April 2020, the Commission presented a revised budget proposal in response to the pandemic and the crisis. This proposal included the new post-COVID recovery plan, NextGenerationEU.


The EU budget for 2021-2027 prioritises climate adaptation and digitalisation. To cope with Brexit and the coronavirus crisis, the EU budget has been increased to more than € 1.2 trillion. An additional stimulus package of around € 800 billion has been added to the existing EU financial instruments. This provides an excellent opportunity for all stakeholders to boost the economy across Europe.

The general trends of the MFF and its programmes are as follows:

- Greater European cohesion with a larger budget

- Creation of synergies and standardisation of relevant programmes and regulations
- More efficient and targeted use of EU funds
- Strong focus on sustainability, environment & climate and digitalisation
- More money for thematic flagship programmes, less money for infrastructure and cohesion

Since the adoption of the EU's long-term budget for 2021-2027 in 2020, the EU has faced unprecedented and unforeseen crises: from Russia's war of aggression against Ukraine and its consequences, to the acceleration of inflation and interest rates, to migration and external challenges such as the conflict in the Middle East. Tackling these multiple challenges has stretched the resources of the EU budget to the limit, hampering its ability to address even the most pressing challenges. To ensure that the EU budget can continue to deliver on its key objectives, the European Commission proposed in June 2023 to strengthen the EU's long-term budget.



In February 2024, EU leaders endorsed all the priorities of the Commission's proposal and agreed on the first-ever revision of the EU's long-term budget. Key elements include:

- Critical support for Ukraine: A new Ukraine Facility, based on grants, loans, and guarantees, with a total capacity of € 50 billion over the period 2024-2027, addresses Ukraine's immediate needs, reconstruction, and modernisation on its path towards the EU.
- Strengthening sovereignty and competitiveness: The Strategic Technologies for Europe Platform boosts the EU's long-term competitiveness in critical technologies, digital and deep tech, clean tech, and biotech, with new flexibilities and incentives for cohesion funding and the Recovery and Resilience Facility, and a € 1.5 billion top-up to the European Defence Fund.
- Further action on Migration and external challenges: An increase of € 9.6 billion supports the internal and external dimensions of migration and helps partners in the Western Balkans, southern neighbourhood and beyond.
- Stronger response to unforeseen crisis: To enable the EU budget to continue to respond to unforeseen circumstances - such as the energy crisis, food crises and the aftermath of Russia's war amid rising inflation and interest costs – the Flexibility Instrument will be reinforced by € 2 billion while the ceiling of the Emergency Aid Reserve will be increased by €1.5 billion and split into two separate instruments: the European Solidarity Reserve and the Emergency Aid Reserve.
- More crisis resilience: A three-step emergency mechanism and a new instrument will provide clarity on the budgetary mechanisms for financing the costs associated with NextGenerationEU.

EU funding instruments are divided into two groups: indirectly managed funds and directly managed funds. Indirectly managed funds are further subdivided into ,funds for the implementation of cohesion policy' and ,funds for the implementation of agricultural and fisheries policy'. Directly managed funds are subdivided into ,sectoral programmes' and ,external action programmes'. The ,sectoral programmes' have an internal effect and apply to the EU27. They are mainly used by the EU Member States.

The EU uses ,external action programmes' to implement its foreign policy and they have an impact outside the EU. This classification is based on differences in management, objectives and regional focus.

Typical characteristics of indirectly managed funds

These funds support national and regional projects aimed at promoting the structural adjustment of specific sectors, regions or combinations thereof. Management and administration are decentralised and the responsibility of each Member State or region.

The EU or its institutions in Brussels do not centralise management and administration, as these are primarily intended to operate at local, national and regional levels.

Funds for the implementation of cohesion policy (ESF+, ERDF, Cohesion Fund, INTERREG) are distributed according to a regional key. The less developed regions receive more money in relation to their national GDP. This approach aims to gradually equalise the level of development of all EU Member States and regions through investment in infrastructure, the economy and the population.

The agricultural and fisheries policies have their own funds, namely EAFRD/LEADER, EAGF and EMFAF. These funds provide subsidies for these two sectors. In addition, there is limited support for projects aimed at preserving and improving rural areas and EU waters surrounding these sectors.

Typical characteristics of directly managed funds

The EU funds projects that support its common interests and values and contribute to its objectives of innovation, jobs and growth.

The European Commission supports European cooperation projects in various thematic areas, such as research and innovation, entrepreneurship, culture, education and the environment, through its funding programmes. The European Commission's specialised departments or executive agencies manage these programmes. In addition, national agencies in certain thematic areas provide advice and manage programmes at national level, receiving funds from Brussels (e.g. ERASMUS+).

Multiannual Financial Framework - Heading: Single Market, Innovation and Digital Cluster: Research & Innovation

Summary

Horizon Europe is the EU's key funding programme for **research and innovation** with a budget of EUR 95.5 billion. It tackles climate change, helps to achieve the UN's [Sustainable Development Goals](#) (SDGs) and boosts the EU's competitiveness and growth. The programme facilitates collaboration and strengthens the impact of research and innovation in developing, supporting and implementing EU policies while tackling global challenges. It supports creating and better dispersing of excellent knowledge and technologies, creates jobs, boosts economic growth, promotes industrial competitiveness and optimises investment impact within a European Research Area.

Horizon Europe involves research and innovation missions to increase the effectiveness of funding by pursuing clearly

defined objectives. The Commission has commissioned policy experts to produce studies, case studies and reports on how a mission-oriented policy approach can work.

Five areas have been identified, each with its own mission panel and assembly. The Panel and Assembly will help specify, design and implement the specific missions that will start under Horizon Europe in 2021.

Priorities

Horizon Europe supports European Partnerships, in which the EU, national authorities and/or the private sector jointly commit to support the development and implementation of a programme of research and innovation activities. The aim of the European Partnerships is to contribute to the achievement of EU priorities, address complex challenges outlined in Horizon Europe and strengthen the European Research Area (ERA). For example, the partnerships aim to improve preparedness and response to infectious diseases, develop efficient low-carbon aircraft for clean aviation or improve animal health. The **European Institute of Innovation & technology (EIT)** is an integral part of Horizon Europe. Its mission is to create jobs and deliver sustainable and smart growth. The goal is to find and commercialise solutions to pressing global challenges. For each global challenge, there is an ecosystem of partnerships called [Knowledge and Innovation Communities](#). To face these global challenges, the community of partners offers a wide range of [education courses](#), [business creation and acceleration services](#), and [innovation-driven research projects](#).

The EIT's objectives are tied with those of [Horizon Europe](#). It is dedicated to tackling climate change and achieving the [UN Sustainable Development Goals](#) and to boosting the EU's global competitiveness and economic growth.

Pillar III of Horizon Europe is where the EIT comes in as contributors with a budget of € 3 billion, they:

- Strengthen sustainable innovation ecosystems across Europe;

Multiannual Financial Framework - Heading: Single Market, Innovation and Digital Cluster: Research & Innovation

Summary

The EU Missions are bold, inspiring and highly visible projects for citizens, demonstrating the added value of European investment in research and innovation. They are a new way to bring concrete solutions to some of our greatest challenges. EU Missions have ambitious goals that are time-

bound, realistic, measurable and targeted and will deliver concrete results by 2030.

Rooted in research and innovation, missions aim to tackle societal challenges with systemic solutions, leading to societal transformations and social impact.

Priorities

Five mission areas have been included in the Horizon Europe Regulation (Adaptation to Climate Change, including Societal Transformation; Cancer; Healthy Ocean, Seas, Coastal and Inland Waters; Climate-Neutral and Smart Cities; Soil Health and Food). In 2021, Missions went through an initial preparatory phase, during which implementations plans were developed. These included detailed objectives, specific interventions, investment strategy and performance indicators for each mission. In summer 2021, the implementation plans have been assessed against objective criteria and all five proposed EU Missions have now entered their full implementation:

- [Adaptation to Climate Change: support at least 150 European regions and communities to become climate resilient by 2030;](#)

The aim of this mission is to prepare Europe to cope with climate change by 2030. The aim is to enable the transition to a healthy and prosperous future without exhausting the

earth's ecological limits. The basis for this is social transformation that strengthens social resilience.

- [Cancer: working with Europe's Beating Cancer Plan to improve the lives of more than 3 million people by 2030 through prevention, cure and solutions to live longer and better;](#)

The mission „Beating Cancer“ aims to save more than 3 million lives by 2030 and to improve the life expectancy and quality of life of people affected by cancer. Through a better understanding of cancer and improved prevention, diagnosis and treatment, it aims to improve the quality of life of all people affected and ensure equitable access to cancer treatment across Europe.

- [Restore our Ocean and Waters by 2030;](#)

By 2030, oceans and waters are cleaned of pollution, degraded ecosystems and habitats are restored and the economy is carbon neutral in line with the concept of the „Blue Economy“. The aim of this mission is to make the

essential goods and services that we obtain or derive from our oceans and waters usable in a sustainable manner.

- [100 Climate-Neutral and Smart Cities by 2030:](#)

100 European cities will be supported and promoted as „living labs“ for experiments and innovations on the path to climate neutrality as part of this mission.

- [A Soil Deal for Europe: 100 living labs and lighthouses to lead the transition towards healthy soils by 2030.](#)

By 2030, 100 living labs and lighthouses are established to lead the transition to healthy soils. Through the Soil Mission, Europe is able to continue to provide essential ecosystem services that we depend on if we want healthy food and healthy nature.

Missions will continue to help deliver key EU policy priorities such as such as the [European Green Deal](#), [Europe fit for the Digital Age](#), [Beating Cancer](#) and the [New European Bauhaus](#).

For instance, Mission Climate is a concrete element of the new [Climate Adaptation Strategy](#), Mission Cancer of the Europe's [Beating Cancer Plan](#) and the Mission Soil is a

flagship initiative of the [Long-term Vision for the EU's Rural Areas](#).

To achieve their goals and promote societal change, missions will implement the reuse and reproducibility of research results such as FAIR research data and open access to scientific publications. Also, the missions will closely involve citizens in their implementation and monitoring throughout their duration, also showcasing the added value of the EU.

EU Missions are a coordinated effort by the Commission to pool the necessary resources in terms of policies and regulations, as well as other activities. They also aim to mobilise and activate public and private actors, such as EU Member States, regional and local authorities, research institutes, farmers and land managers, entrepreneurs and investors to create real and lasting impact. Missions engage with citizens to boost societal uptake of new solutions and approaches.

EU Missions support Europe's transformation into a greener, healthier, more inclusive and resilient continent. They aim to bring tangible benefits to people in Europe and engage Europeans in their design, implementation and monitoring.

Multiannual Financial Framework - Heading: Single Market, Innovation and Digital Cluster: Research & Innovation

Summary

The New European Bauhaus Facility 2025-2027 is a new and development and scaling up of innovative solutions for the unique **funding tool for the New European Bauhaus** (NEB). It is an initiative of the European Union that fosters the

development and scaling up of **innovative solutions for the transformation of neighbourhoods** to become not only sustainable, but also inclusive and beautiful.

Priorities

The political guidelines highlight that the NEB can bring sustainability together with inclusion and affordability, and creativity with innovation. Challenges like the housing crisis or the green transformation are addressed by putting people's needs first, with the goal to improve their lives. The NEB also contributes to creating lead markets for the Clean Industrial Deal by considering embodied greenhouse gas emissions. To this end, the NEB fosters the development of innovative solutions in the built environment and beyond.

Against this backdrop, the NEB Facility is a multi-annual (2025-2027) and cross-cutting tool to revitalise European neighbourhoods with design for sustainability and inclusion. It will support projects on the sustainable transformation of the built environment. The NEB Facility aims to make the inhabitants of the built environment partners of change.

Activities under the NEB Facility should contribute to the wider social acceptance of the innovative solutions developed, accelerating the just green and digital transformation and strengthening and restoring citizens' trust in democracy. They should also explore the built environment's function in the conservation and restoration

of natural ecosystems, its relation to historical urban, peri-urban or rural areas, the improvement of social cohesion as well as people's health and well-being. The NEB Facility is composed of a research and innovation (R&I) component and a roll-out component.

The R&I component will cover fundamental research, testing and demonstration. It will be implemented as a cross-cluster issue in the Horizon Europe Work Programmes with an indicative budget of €120 million per year for the period 2025-27. The roll-out component of the NEB Facility will seek to facilitate the uptake, further development and deployment of new knowledge, methods, approaches and technologies developed under the R&I component. The roll out component will also include all actions delivered under EU programmes that contribute to the goals of the Facility and particularly the implementation of the NEB values and principles at the neighbourhood level.

The commitment and the support of innovative solutions are rooted in the three intertwined NEB values: **sustainable, inclusive and beautiful**. Sustainability is about prioritising the needs of all life forms and of the planet by ensuring that

human activity does not exceed planetary boundaries which define a safe operating space for humanity based on the intrinsic biophysical processes that regulate the stability of the Earth system. Inclusion means granting and securing equal access to opportunities and resources for all and encouraging exchanges across cultures, genders, ages, and socioeconomic groups. Beautiful refers to projects that are genuinely attentive to their context which includes arts and culture, quality, diversity and heritage.

A NEB project should embrace three working principles: **participatory process, multi-level engagement and transdisciplinary approach**. All three working principles should foster co-creation and co-development. Participatory processes ensure that stakeholders have a voice in projects that affect them in addressing transformational change. Multi-level engagement implements an effective exchange between public and private peers and others who operate on a different scale, bridging the local and global dimension. Transdisciplinary approaches aim for higher integration of knowledge and go beyond technical disciplines. They address in particular social, artistic and design expertise. They should ground scientific expertise in society by drawing on the knowledge of non-academics, the public, and public administrations. Architects or designers can play a role of facilitators to integrate different actors and disciplines. Within the scientific field, the social sciences, arts and humanities play an important role to emphasise the holistic nature.

In order to foster dialogue, collaboration, and creativity, bringing together different disciplines and different stakeholders, the NEB relies on **four thematic axes** which link the initiative to the people and their interests, needs and motivations. The first axis is about **reconnecting with nature** and going beyond a human-centred to a life-centred perspective. The second one is about regaining a **sense of belonging** and magnifying and linking collective and private

experiences and building bridges between people. The third axis is about prioritising the **places and people most in need** and ensuring that beauty and sustainability are affordable and accessible to all. The fourth axis is about the need for **long-term, lifecycle thinking** in the circular economy and tackling unsustainable use of resources, including obsolete buildings or infrastructures, and waste.

The specific contributions to the expected impacts are:

1. Connecting the green transformation, social inclusion and local democracy
2. Circular and regenerative approaches for the built environment
3. Innovative funding and new business models for the transformation of neighbourhoods

Under the R&I component, applicants are encouraged to explore complementarities with topics and activities in Horizon Europe partnerships (in particular: Built4People, Circular Bio-based Europe and Driving Urban Transition, Forests and Forestry for a Sustainable Future, Innovative Materials for the EU, Processes4Planet, Resilient Cultural Heritage, Social Transformations and Resilience, and Textile of the Future), Missions (in particular the Climate-Neutral and Smart Cities Mission and the Adaptation to Climate Change Mission) and Clusters (in particular Cluster 2 - Culture, Creativity, and Inclusive Society, Cluster 3 - Civil Security for Society, Cluster 5 - Climate, Energy and Mobility, and Cluster 6 - Food, Bioeconomy, Natural Resources, Agriculture & Environment). Opportunities for collaboration and synergies should also be explored and, as appropriate, pursued with other relevant initiatives such as the innovation ecosystems or the Knowledge and Innovation Communities of the European Institute of Innovation and Technology. Additionally, Horizon Europe grantees are invited to consider possible collaborations and cross-fertilisation between their project and other projects.

Multiannual Financial Framework - Heading: Single Market, Innovation and Digital Cluster: Research & Innovation

Summary

Cluster 1, 'Health' of the Horizon Europe programme covers a wide range of topics in the field of health research. Projects will cover as far as possible the full spectrum of the research and innovation cycle and should also contribute to the translation of research results into health care. The objectives of this cluster are to improve and protect the health and well-being of citizens of all ages through the generation of new knowledge, the development of innovative solutions and, where appropriate, the integration of a gender perspective in the **prevention, diagnosis, monitoring, treatment and cure of diseases**.

It also aims to develop health technologies, reduce health risks, protect populations and promote health and well-being in general and at work.

Finally, this cluster aims to make **public health systems more cost-effective, equitable and sustainable**, to prevent and treat poverty-related diseases, and to support and enable patient participation and self-management.

Areas of intervention:

- Health across the life course;
- Environmental and Social Determinants of Health;
- Non-communicable diseases and rare diseases;
- Infectious diseases, including poverty-related and neglected diseases;
- Tools, technologies and digital solutions for health and care, including personalised medicine Health systems.

Priorities

Destination 1: Staying healthy in a rapidly changing society will focus on the major societal challenges that are among the European Commission's policy priorities, in particular nutrition and health (obesity), ageing and demographic change, mental health, digital empowerment for health literacy and personalised prevention.

Destination 2: Living and working in health-promoting environments aims to fill knowledge gaps on the impact on our health and well-being of those environmental, occupational and socioeconomic risk factors that have the greatest or most far-reaching impact on society.

Destination 3: Combating disease and reducing the burden of disease will focus on the major societal challenges related to the Commission's policy priorities, such as combating cancer and other non-communicable diseases, better diagnosis and treatment of rare diseases, preparedness, response and surveillance of health threats and epidemics, reducing antimicrobial resistant infections, improving immunisation coverage, demographic change, mental health and digital empowerment for health literacy.

Destination 4: Ensuring access to innovative, sustainable and high-quality health care, research and innovation will

support the transformation of health systems to ensure equitable access to sustainable and high-quality health services for all citizens. Funded activities should support the development of innovative, feasible, implementable, financially sound and scalable solutions in the different areas of health systems (e.g. governance, financing, human and material resources, health service delivery and patient empowerment).

Destination 5: Realising the full potential of new tools, technologies and digital solutions for a healthy society aims to stimulate the development of tools, technologies and digital solutions for treatments, medicines, medical devices and improved health outcomes, taking into account safety, efficacy, appropriateness, accessibility, comparative added value and financial sustainability, as well as ethical, legal and regulatory issues.

In particular, to address the green and digital transformation and the adequate supply of health technologies and products, **Destination 6: Sustaining an innovative, sustainable and globally competitive health industry** will focus on research and innovation activities aimed at.

- Production of medicines in line with the objectives of the [European Green Deal](#);
- Methodologies, guidelines and standards, evaluation studies and structuring activities adapted to digital solutions and measures for GDPR-compliant implementation in healthcare practice, including interoperability, cybersecurity and data confidentiality;
- Supporting authorities with better methodologies and interdisciplinary approaches for the assessment and evaluation of new health technologies/interventions;
- Development of pharmaceutical products to address unmet medical needs in the context of market failures.

Summary

The activities of Cluster 2 'Culture, Creativity and Inclusive Society' are primarily addressed to researchers and applicants from the **humanities, social sciences, cultural studies and the arts**. Projects in the various themes of this cluster will make an innovative and application-oriented contribution to important and forward-looking research and societal issues in Europe.

Current and future developments require new ways of thinking about how democratic institutions at all levels can adapt. This is particularly relevant in the context of **increasing diversity, global competition, technological progress and digitalisation**. Citizens' experiences of

democratic discourses, practices and institutions are essential for successful adaptation to these changes.

This cluster aims to **strengthen European democratic values, including the rule of law and fundamental rights, to preserve our cultural heritage and to promote socioeconomic changes that contribute to inclusion and growth**

Areas of intervention

- Democracy and governance;
- Cultural heritage;
- Social and economic change.

Priorities

Destination 1: Innovative research on democracy and governance

Democratic governance will be revitalised by improving the **accountability, transparency, effectiveness and trustworthiness of rule of law institutions and policies**, and by developing an active and inclusive citizen, empowered by respect for fundamental rights.

The implementation of **research activities** under this objective will contribute to revitalising and modernising democratic governance. The aim is to develop evidence-based innovations, strategies and policy recommendations, as well as institutional frameworks that promote political participation, social dialogue, civic engagement, gender

equality and the inclusion of all citizens. Activities will also contribute to improving the transparency, effectiveness, accountability and legitimacy of public policy-making. They will contribute to strengthening confidence in democratic institutions, protecting civil liberties and the rule of law, and safeguarding democracy against multidimensional threats. Rich historical, cultural and philosophical perspectives, including a comparative dimension, will provide the framework for a sound understanding of current developments and help to chart future paths. In the medium to long term, the insights, data, science-based recommendations and innovations generated will improve decision-making in all areas relevant to democratic governance.

Destination 2: Innovative research on European cultural heritage and cultural and creative industries

- Use of digital/modern technologies;
- Active and sustained cooperation with stakeholders, social innovators and citizens;
- Active involvement of local, regional or national authorities and sectoral social partners, in particular in the uptake and implementation of research results and recommendations;
- A clear strategy for the uptake of research findings, recommendations or results, in particular where CCIs are involved or affected;
- Training/education activities for specific groups of users and/or stakeholders;
- A solid plan for how projects will use or build on the results of research already conducted and technology already available;
- Increased participation of CCIs, SMEs and industry;

- Lessons learned from the COVID 19 crisis in terms of sustainable management of post-crisis society;
- Contributing to the [European Green Deal](#), the [New European Bauhaus](#) and the [Sustainable Development Goals](#).

Destination 3: Innovative research on social and economic transformations

Social and economic resilience and sustainability will be strengthened through a better understanding of the social, ethical, political and economic impacts of drivers of change (such as technology, globalisation, demography, mobility and migration) and their interactions.

Inclusive growth will be promoted and vulnerabilities effectively reduced through evidence-based policies that **protect and promote employment, education, social equity and address inequalities**, including in response to the socioeconomic challenges posed by the pandemic.

Summary

The Civil Security for Society Cluster supports the implementation of EU policy priorities in the areas of **security, cybersecurity and civil protection**. The objective is to improve the **prevention, investigation and mitigation of the effects of crime, including new/emerging criminal modus operandi (e.g. exploitation of digitalisation and other technologies)**. Such an approach must be based on a deeper knowledge of the human and social aspects of relevant societal challenges such as sexual

Destination 1: Better protect the EU and its citizens from crime and terrorism supports projects that demonstrate a way to contribute to the following expected impacts of the [Horizon Europe Strategic Plan 2021-2024](#): 'Crime and terrorism will be fought more effectively, while respecting fundamental rights, thanks to more effective prevention, preparedness and response, a better understanding of the human, societal and technological aspects involved and the development of state-of-the-art capabilities for police authorities, including measures against cybercrime'.

Destination 2: Efficient management of the EU's external borders supports projects that demonstrate a way forward to contribute to the following expected impacts of the

Horizon Europe 2021-2024 strategic plan 'Legal passengers and consignments will travel more easily to the EU, while illegal trafficking, smuggling, piracy, terrorism and other criminal activities will be prevented through improved management of air, land and maritime borders and maritime security, including better knowledge of social factors'.

Summary

Digitalisation and technological progress are shaping all sectors of the economy and society and influencing industrial development - including space research. Horizon Europe's Cluster 4 'Digitalisation, Industry and Space' supports **key digital, industrial and space technologies** that are strategic for Europe's industrial future. The aim is to build a **resilient, green and digital Europe**.

The overarching vision underpinning the proposed investments in Cluster 4 is for Europe to develop competitive and trusted technologies for a European industry that leads the world in key areas, enabling production and consumption to respect the limits of our planet and maximising benefits for all parts of society in the different social, economic and territorial contexts in Europe.

This will build a **competitive, digital, low-carbon and circular industry, ensure a sustainable supply of raw**

materials, develop advanced materials and provide the basis for progress and innovation to address global societal challenges.

Areas of intervention

- Manufacturing technologies;
- Key digital technologies, including quantum technologies;
- Emerging enabling technologies;
- Advanced materials;
- Artificial intelligence and robotics;
- Next generation internet;
- Advanced Computing and Big Data;
- Circular economy;
- Low-carbon and clean industries;
- Space, including Earth observation.

Priorities

Actions under **Destination 1: Climate Neutral, Circular and Digitalised Production** will focus on the double green and digital transition, providing a green productivity premium for discrete manufacturing, construction and energy- intensive industries, including process industries. This will make a substantial and significant contribution to achieving climate neutrality in the European Union by 2050 and to achieving a circular economy.

Topics under **Destination 2: Greater autonomy in key**

strategic value chains for a resilient industry will address missing segments in strategic areas and value chains in order to strengthen the EU industrial base and promote its competitiveness and open strategic autonomy. It will also explore how a strengthened circular economy has the potential to increase the open strategic autonomy of EU industry through a more efficient use of resources and secondary raw materials.

The overarching objective of the themes in **Destination 3: World-leading data and computing technologies** is to establish European supply and value chains in cloud, edge computing, Internet of Things (IoT) and tactile Internet by integrating relevant elements of computing, connectivity, IoT and AI cybersecurity. Priorities

The activities carried out under **Destination 1 Climate Science and Responses for the Transition to Climate Neutrality** will enable the transition to a climate neutral and resilient society and economy by improving knowledge of the Earth system and the ability to predict and project its changes under different natural and socio-economic drivers, including a better understanding of society's response and behavioural changes, and enabling better assessment of climate change impacts and the design and evaluation of solutions and pathways to mitigate and adapt to climate change and associated societal change.

Destination 2: Cross-sectoral solutions for the climate transition includes thematic areas that are inherently cross-sectoral and can provide important solutions for climate,

energy and mobility applications. In line with Cluster 5, these are batteries, hydrogen, communities and cities, breakthrough technologies in early-stage citizen engagement.

Destination 3: Sustainable, secure and competitive energy supply includes activities aiming at a sustainable, secure and competitive energy supply. In line with the scope of Cluster 5, this includes activities in renewable energy, energy systems, grids and storage, and carbon capture, utilisation and storage (CCUS).

Destination 4: Efficient, sustainable and inclusive energy use addresses activities that target the energy demand

side, especially more efficient energy use in buildings and industry. Themes targeting energy efficiency in buildings aim to achieve the following impacts:

- A more energy efficient building stock, based on a thorough understanding of building performance in Europe and related developments.
- A building stock that effectively combines energy efficiency, renewable energy sources and digital and smart technologies to support the transformation of the energy system towards climate neutrality.

Destination 5: Clean and competitive solutions for all transport modes addresses measures to improve the climate and environmental performance and competitiveness of different transport modes. Key areas:

- Accelerated deployment of zero-emission, affordable, user-oriented solutions for road-based mobility across Europe.
- Increased user acceptance, improved air quality, a more circular economy and reduced environmental impact.

- Affordable, user-friendly charging infrastructure concepts and technologies that include vehicle-network interactions.
- Innovative use cases for zero tailpipe vehicle integration and infrastructure concepts for on-road mobility of people and goods.
- Effective design, assessment and deployment of innovative concepts for road vehicles and mobility services using life cycle assessment tools and capabilities in the context of the circular economy.

Summary

The aim of research, development and innovation in cluster 6 is to increase knowledge, build capacity and develop innovative solutions in these relevant areas. This includes in particular the **transition to a sustainable circular economy and the use of natural resources, as well as food security** for all.

This cluster aims to reduce environmental degradation, halt and reverse the decline of terrestrial, freshwater and marine **biodiversity**, and better manage **natural resources** through economic and social transformation in both **urban and rural areas**.

Knowledge, innovation and digitalisation in agriculture, fisheries, aquaculture and food systems will ensure food and

nutrition security for all within planetary boundaries and guide and accelerate the transition to a low-carbon, resource-efficient circular economy and a sustainable bioeconomy, including forestry.

Areas of intervention

- Environmental monitoring;
- Biodiversity and Natural Resources;
- Agriculture, Forestry and Rural Areas;
- Seas, oceans and inland waters;
- Food systems;
- Bio-based innovation systems in the EU bioeconomy;
- Circulation systems.

Priorities

Destination 1: Biodiversity and ecosystem services will support policy objectives, develop nature-based solutions and holistic approaches to address the main drivers of biodiversity loss, in particular those related to production systems, and bring together all sectors to integrate them into ecosystem-based management. Investment in R&D will help to protect and restore the integrity of terrestrial, aquatic and marine ecosystems.

Destination 2: Fair, healthy and environmentally sound food systems from primary production to consumption and the 'farm to fork' strategy aim to deliver shared environmental, health, social and economic benefits and

ensure that the actions leading to overcoming the crisis also put us on a sustainable path for the future. Research and innovation (R&I) are key drivers to guide and accelerate the transition to sustainable, safe, healthy and inclusive food systems, ensuring food and nutrition security for all.

Destination 3: Circular and bio-economy sectors aims at climate-neutral transitions in the circular and bio-economy sectors, encompassing safe and integrated circular solutions at territorial and sectoral levels for key material flows and product value chains, such as the textile, electronics, plastics and construction sectors, as well as key bio-economy sectors.

Destination 4: A clean environment and zero pollution, the [European Green Deal](#) and the [Climate Action Plan 2030](#), as well as other relevant EU legislation, aim to stop and prevent pollution by focusing on fresh and marine water, soil, air, including nitrogen and phosphorus emissions, and the environmental performance and sustainability of processes in bio-based systems.

Destination 5: Land, ocean and water for climate protection aims to assess the impacts of climate change on our land and marine environment, natural resources, agriculture and food systems, and to identify options for mitigation and adaptation. Research is also needed to identify mitigation options that reduce the risk of long-term climate change.

Destination 6: Resilient, inclusive, healthy and green rural, coastal and urban communities will support transdisciplinary R&I with a strong social and behavioural science dimension and taking into account gender aspects to promote sustainable, balanced and inclusive development of rural, coastal and urban areas in three different ways:

- Improving our understanding of the different impacts of climatic, environmental, socioeconomic and

demographic changes on rural, coastal and urban areas in order to find ways to transform these changes into equal opportunities for people wherever they live, to strengthen territorial cohesion and to enable a just transition;

- To explore innovative ways of finding policy responses to place-based challenges identified at different levels of governance;
- Support community-led innovation to enable communities to develop, test and disseminate solutions that address global challenges in locally appropriate ways.

Destination 7: Innovative governance, environmental monitoring and digital solutions in support of the Green Deal aims to test new ways of managing the transition process and modernising governance. R&I for governance in support of the Green Deal aims to provide insights into institutional barriers such as lock-ins, path dependency, political and cultural inertia, power imbalances and regulatory inconsistencies or weaknesses.

Summary

The Connecting Europe Facility (CEF) is an important EU financial instrument for promoting growth, jobs and competitiveness through targeted **infrastructure investment** at European level. It supports the development of high-capacity, sustainable and efficiently interconnected **trans-European networks in the areas of transport, energy and digital services**. CEF investments fill the gaps in Europe's energy, transport and digital backbone.

The CEF will benefit people in all Member States by making travel easier and more sustainable, increasing Europe's

energy security while enabling wider use of renewable energy, and facilitating cross-border interaction between public administrations, businesses and citizens.

In addition to grants, CEF provides financial support to projects through innovative financial instruments such as guarantees and project bonds. These instruments have a significant leverage effect on the use of EU budget funds and act as a catalyst to attract further funding from the private sector and other public actors.

The second generation of the Connecting Europe Facility (CEF-2 programme), Digital strand (2021-2027), aims to support and promote **investments in digital connectivity infrastructure** of common interest.

The measures to be supported under CEF-2 Digital include:

- Deployment of or access to very **high capacity networks**, including 5G systems capable of providing gigabit connectivity in areas where socio-economic factors such as schools, universities, hospitals, transport hubs, public administrations, etc. are located;

- Uninterrupted coverage with 5G systems on all major transport routes, including trans-European transport networks;
- **Deployment of new or significant upgrades of existing backbone networks**, including submarine cables, both within EU Member States and between them and third countries;
- **Building digital connectivity infrastructures** related to cross-border transport and energy projects and/or supporting operational digital platforms directly connected to these infrastructures.

The Connecting Europe Facility (CEF) for Energy is the EU funding program for the implementation of the [Trans-European Networks for Energy policy](#). It aims to support investments in the construction of new **cross-border energy infrastructure in Europe** or in the rehabilitation and upgrading of existing infrastructure.

A forward-looking, modern, secure and smart energy infrastructure is key to achieving the [European Green Deal](#).

The Trans-European Energy Networks (TEN-E) framework will be a key enabler for achieving the Union's 2030 and 2050 **decarbonization targets**, while contributing to sector and market integration, security of supply and competition.

The [TEN-E policy](#) focuses on **interconnecting the energy infrastructure of EU countries**. To address energy infrastructure needs at the regional and European level, the TEN-E strategy identified priority corridors and three priority thematic areas. The Connecting Europe Facility program supports the implementation of Projects of Common Interest (PCIs) in these priority corridors and thematic areas.

The three priority thematic areas, which cover the entire EU, include the deployment of smart grids, electricity highways, and a cross-border carbon network.

- **Deployment of smart grids:** increasing the deployment of smart grids to support the integration of renewable and enable consumers to better regulate their energy consumption
- **Electricity highways:** Building electricity highways - large grids that allow electricity to be transported across

The Connecting Europe Facility (CEF) for Transport is the financial instrument for implementing [European transport infrastructure policy](#). It aims to support investments in the construction of new transport infrastructure in Europe or in the rehabilitation and modernization of existing infrastructure.

The policy objectives of the Trans-European Networks for Transport (TEN-T) provide for:

- **Completion of the core network by 2030**, consisting of nine multimodal core network corridors.
- **Completion of the comprehensive network by 2050** to facilitate accessibility to all European regions.

CEF Transport focuses on cross-border projects and projects to remove bottlenecks or bridge missing links in different sections of the core network and the comprehensive network (Link), as well as horizontal priorities such as traffic management systems.

The Transportation CEF also supports innovations in the transportation system to improve infrastructure use, reduce the environmental impact of transportation, increase energy efficiency, and improve safety.

Summary

The Digital Europe programme is an EU funding programme focused on **making digital technologies accessible to businesses, citizens and public administrations**. The Digital Europe programme will provide strategic funding to address these challenges and support projects in five key areas: **High Performance Computing, Artificial Intelligence, Cybersecurity, Advanced Digital Skills and Ensuring the widespread use of digital technologies** in business and society, including through Digital Innovation Centres.

With a total planned budget of € 7.5 billion, the aim is to accelerate economic recovery and shape the digital

transformation of European society and economy for the benefit of all, especially small and medium-sized enterprises.

The Digital Europe programme plays a strategic role in supporting the digital transformation of the EU's industrial ecosystems and aims to upskill the workforce for these advanced digital technologies. It supports industry, small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs) and public administrations in their digital transformation through a strengthened network of [European Digital Innovation Hubs \(EDIH\)](#). The programme will accelerate economic recovery and drive Europe's digital transformation.

Priorities

Specific objective 1 - High performance computing

- Deploy, coordinate at Union level & operate a demand-driven & application-driven integrated Exa supercomputing & data infrastructure;
- Deploy ready-to-use operational technology from research & innovation to build an integrated ecosystem for high performance computing in the Union (with high levels of security and data protection);
- Deploy and operate a post-Exa infrastructure

Specific objective 2 - Artificial Intelligence

- Build & strengthen core capacities & basic knowledge in the field of AI;

Specific objective 4 - Advanced digital competencies

- High-quality long-term training and courses, including integrated learning, for students and for the workforce;
- High-quality short-term training and courses for the workforce;
- High-quality on-the-job training and internships for students and workers.

Specific objective 5 - Adoption and optimal use of digital capacities and interoperability

- Support the public sector and areas of public interest to adopt and use advanced digital technologies, such as high performance computing, AI and cybersecurity;
- Deploy, operate and maintain trans-European interoperable modern infrastructures for digital services;
- Support the integration/use of trans-European infrastructures for digital services;
- Facilitate the development, update & use of solutions and frameworks by public administrations, businesses and citizens;
- Offer the Union's public sector and industry the opportunity to test and pilot digital technologies;
- Support the deployment of advanced digital and related technologies;
- Support the design, testing, implementation, deployment and maintenance of interoperable digital solutions;
- Ensure that the capacity for leadership in digital progress is consistently available at Union level;
- Supporting cooperation towards the realisation of a European ecosystem for trusted data sharing and trusted digital infrastructures;
- Establish and strengthen the European Digital Innovation Centres and their network.



The Single Market Programme (SMP) is the EU funding programme to help the single market reach its full potential and ensure Europe's recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic. With € 4.2 billion over the period of 2021-2027, it provides an integrated package to support and strengthen the governance of the single market.

The SMP has six objectives:

Summary

The European Regional Development Fund (ERDF) aims to strengthen economic, social and territorial cohesion in the European Union by redressing imbalances between regions. Over the period 2021-2027, it will enable investment in a smarter, greener, better connected and more social Europe that is closer to its citizens.

ERDF funds programmes in shared responsibility between the European Commission and Member States' national and regional authorities. Member State administrations select the projects to be funded and are responsible for day-to-day management. Over the period 2021-2027, the Fund will enable investments that move Europe and its regions forward:

- **More competitive and smarter** through innovation and support for small and medium-sized enterprises, and through digitalisation and digital connectivity (policy objective 1 - PO1);

- Greener, low-carbon and resilient (policy objective 2 - PO2);
- More connected by improving mobility (policy objective 3 - PO3);
- **More social** by promoting effective and inclusive employment, education, skills, social inclusion and equitable access to health care, and strengthening the role of culture and sustainable tourism (Policy Objective 4 - PO4);
- Proximity to citizens, supporting locally-led development and sustainable urban development across the EU (Policy Objective 5 - PO5).

In addition to the five ERDF policy objectives, the Interreg programmes have two further policy objectives, namely '**Better governance of cooperation**' and '**A safer and more secure Europe**'.

Priorities

The European Regional Development Fund will support investments under all five policy objectives, but all regions and Member States will focus support on a more competitive

and smarter Europe (PO1) and a greener, low-carbon, low-carbon economy and resilient Europe (PO2), based on their prosperity, through the 'thematic concentration' mechanism.

All regions and Member States will focus at least 30% of their allocation on PO2 and:

- More developed regions or Member States will devote at least 85% of their allocation to PO1 and PO2;
- Transition regions or Member States at least 40% for PO1;
- Less developed regions or Member States at least 25% for PO1.

All regions and Member States will also focus at least 8% of their allocation on urban development implemented through Local Development Partnerships with different instruments. ERDF activities are also expected to devote 30 % of the total financial envelope to climate objectives.

European Territorial Cooperation (ETC), better known as Interreg, provides a framework for the implementation of joint actions and policy exchanges between national, regional and local actors from different Member States. The overall objective of European Territorial Cooperation (ETC) is to promote the harmonious economic, social and territorial development of the Union as a whole.

Interreg is based on four areas of cooperation:

- **Cross-border cooperation** between neighbouring regions to promote integrated and harmonious regional development between neighbouring land and maritime border regions (Interreg A)
- **Transnational cooperation** in larger transnational areas or around sea basins, involving national, regional and local programme partners in Member States, third countries and partner countries and OCTs, to achieve a higher degree of territorial integration (Interreg B)
- **Interregional cooperation** to enhance the effectiveness of cohesion policy (Interreg C)
- **Cooperation between the outermost regions** themselves and with their neighbouring third or partner countries or OCTs, or with regional integration and cooperation organisations, or with several such organisations, in order to facilitate their regional integration and harmonious development in their neighbourhood (Interreg D).

Summary

The Alpine Space Programme is a European transnational cooperation programme that funds projects across the Alps. It provides a framework to connect actors from different sectors and different policy levels from seven Alpine countries. Key actors from science and administration, business and the innovation sector as well as policy makers work together to address common challenges and develop joint solutions for the Alpine Space. They share their experience and expertise and strive to improve the quality of life of Alpine inhabitants.

The programme focuses on green, carbon neutral, innovative and governance-related issues. The programme's mission statement also reflects this focus and aims to make this approach widely visible. The following priorities are defined for the period 2021-2027:

Priority 1: Climate-resilient and green Alpine Space

- Objective: Promote climate change adaptation, risk prevention and disaster resilience;

- Objective: Improve conservation and nature, biodiversity and green infrastructure, including in urban areas, and reduce all forms of pollution.

Priority 2: Climate neutral and resource efficient Alpine Space

- Objective: Promote energy efficiency and reduce greenhouse gas emissions;
- Objective: Promoting the transition to a circular economy and resource efficiency.

Priority 3: Innovation and digitalisation for a green Alpine Space

- Objective: Improve research and innovation capacities and the adoption of advanced technologies;
- Objective: Exploit the benefits of digitalisation for citizens, businesses, research institutions and public authorities.

Priority 4 - Specific objective of Interreg: Better governance of cooperation

Priorities

Objective: Promote climate change adaptation, risk prevention and disaster resilience

Under this specific objective, measures to promote adaptation to climate change, i.e. "the process of adapting to

the actual or expected climate and its impacts", as formulated by the IPCC, should be covered.

Objective: Improve conservation and nature, biodiversity and green infrastructure, including in urban areas, and reduce all forms of pollution

Continued and projected habitat loss and fragmentation of biotopes are leading to high biodiversity losses and reducing ecosystem services. The need to reduce fragmentation and loss of biotopes and to promote ecosystem connectivity is therefore great.

Objective: Promote energy efficiency and reduce greenhouse gas emissions

Efficiency concepts alone will most likely not be sufficient to make the transition to a carbon-neutral or even post-carbon society. Innovative steps should therefore go beyond efficiency and promote integrated, sufficiency-oriented concepts of well-being and carbon-neutral lifestyles. This should be coupled with the use of renewable energy sources, which are widely available in the Alpine Space (e.g. hydro, wind, solar, etc.).

Objective: Promoting the transition to a circular economy and resource efficiency

The principles of avoiding waste and trying to use resources for as long as possible are relevant to the entire production cycle. In this respect, the circular economy is a much more comprehensive approach than just recycling or waste management. It strongly supports sustainable development, mindful use of resources, climate neutrality and climate change mitigation and adaptation.

Objective: Enhancing research and innovation capacities and the uptake of advanced technologies

Cooperation in the field of innovation capacities is a transversal activity that can enhance the impact of the programme in specific thematic areas by increasing the innovation potential of Alpine stakeholders. The improvement of research and innovation capacities in the Alpine Space should be effectively promoted through cooperation between actors and stakeholders in different regions.

Objective: Exploit the benefits of digitalisation for citizens, businesses, research institutions and public authorities

New digital tools can be developed to increase the resilience of Alpine regions and mitigate the effects of accessibility problems and remoteness linked to the negative demographic situation in many regions. Such increased flexibility can be particularly attractive in the context of the territorial specificity of the Alps as well as their ambition to become climate resilient, carbon neutral, green, inclusive and resource efficient.

Specific objective of Interreg: A better governance of cooperation

This objective represents a tailor-made opportunity to deepen and develop cooperation and governance structures in the Alpine Space, with a particular focus on professionalising governance and stakeholder structures, as well as preparing the ground for innovative projects and greater involvement of civil society.

Summary

Interreg CENTRAL EUROPE envisions a **united Central Europe working together - to become smarter, greener and better connected together**. Based on common needs and a shared identity in an area long divided by the „Iron Curtain“, the programme aims to create a trusting culture of cooperation across administrative borders.

The programme aims to bring regions and cities together across borders to find appropriate solutions for their citizens - in a fair and equal way everywhere. It promotes and **supports transnational cooperation to make regions more resilient to common challenges** that know no borders and cannot be solved alone. These challenges include economic transition, climate change and the long-term socio-economic consequences of the Covid 19 pandemic.

The programme priorities and specific objectives form the backbone of the [Interreg CENTRAL EUROPE funding](#)

[strategy 2021-27](#). In line with the thematic areas, transnational cooperation actions should address the development and implementation of strategies, action plans, tools, training, pilot actions and related solutions. All actions shall comply with the horizontal principles of sustainable development, including environmental protection, as well as equal opportunities, non-discrimination and gender equality.

The programme has the following priorities:

- Priority 1: Cooperation for a smarter Central Europe.
- Priority 2: Working together for a greener Central Europe
- Priority 3: Working together for a better connected Europe
- Priority 4: Improving governance for cooperation in Central Europe

Priorities

SO 1.1 Strengthening innovation capacities

Strong innovation capacities are important for Central Europe given its strong industrial base & the importance of sectors such as agriculture, food & tourism.

SO 1.2 Strengthening skills for smart specialisation, industrial change and entrepreneurship

SMEs have been identified as the main employment providers in Central Europe and it is important to foster the

locally available human skills, especially for the transition to Industry 4.0, digitalisation and a green economy.

SO 2.1 Supporting the energy transition to a climate-neutral Central Europe

Central Europe needs to accelerate its performance in both energy efficiency and renewable energy generation and use to meet EU targets and the climate goals of the European Green Deal.

SO 2.2 Increasing resilience to climate change risks

To increase resilience to climate change, general approaches need to be adapted locally to develop feasible and manageable integrated solutions that can be disseminated across Central Europe.

SO 2.3 Advancing the circular economy in Central Europe

A climate-neutral, resource-efficient & competitive economy requires highly scaled circular approaches. This economic transformation needs to consider that a circular economy often requires a reorganisation of value chains, changing interdependencies & creating new profit options.

SO 2.4 Safeguarding the environment

The economic and ecological importance of natural assets and landscapes in Central Europe requires coordinated valorisation and protection of biodiversity and ecosystems. There is an urgent need to counteract the negative effects of

human activity through integrated environmental management concepts.

SO 2.5 Greening urban mobility

Smart and greener urban mobility requires an integrated response. Many functional urban areas in Central Europe face similar challenges in greening their mobility.

SO 3.1 Improving transport accessibility of rural and peripheral regions

The programme area is an important crossroads in Europe. This can strategically facilitate participation in trade and increase competitiveness. However, accessibility to major transport corridors is comparatively weak. There is a need to connect peripheral regions in particular to the nodes of the TEN-T core network corridors (CNC), to remove bottlenecks and bridge missing transport links to ensure good accessibility throughout Central Europe.

SO 4.1 Strengthening governance for integrated territorial development

Central Europe is very heterogeneous both territorially and socio-economically. There is a need to improve the capacity of authorities at all territorial levels to elaborate and implement integrated territorial development strategies. Cooperation should be promoted within and between territories that have functional links.

Summary

The Interreg Danube Region Programme works for **economic, social and territorial cohesion through policy networking in selected areas in the Danube Region**. To achieve more territorial integration in the highly heterogeneous Danube Region, the transnational cooperation programme acts as a policy driver and enabler to address common challenges and respond to needs in specific policy areas where transnational cooperation is likely to deliver tangible results.

The Danube macro-region is a region of barriers as it is highly fragmented politically, socio-economically and administratively. The effects of this fragmentation are crucial for the development of the entire region; therefore, the associated boundary effects should be addressed and mitigated. **The fragmentation of the region is not only a weakness, but also an opportunity for greater cooperation and coordinated action** between these countries to overcome these barriers in the areas of innovation, environment, governance and social issues.

Priorities

The following priorities have been identified for the period 2021-2027:

Priority 1: A Smart Danube Region

- Specific objective: Develop and improve research and innovation capacities and the adoption of cutting-edge technologies;
- Specific objective: develop capabilities for smart specialization, industrial transformation and entrepreneurship.

Priority 2: A greener, low-carbon Danube Region

- Specific objective: promoting renewable energy in line with [Directive \(EU\) 2018/2001](#), including the sustainability criteria set out therein;
- Specific objective: to promote climate change adaptation capacities in the Danube Region and disaster management at the transnational level in relation to environmental risks, taking into account ecosystem-based approaches;
- Specific objective: sustainable, integrated, transboundary water and sediment management in the Danube River Basin to ensure good quality and quantity of water and sediment balance;

- Specific objective: Protection and conservation of biodiversity in ecological corridors and ecoregions of transnational importance in the Danube basin.

Priority 3: A more social Danube Region

- Specific objective: Accessible, inclusive and effective labor markets;
- Specific objective: Accessible and inclusive quality services in education, training and lifelong learning;
- Specific objective: Strengthening the role of culture and sustainable tourism for economic development, social inclusion and social innovation.

Priority 4: Better governance of cooperation

- Specific objective: strengthening institutional capacity for territorial and macro-regional governance.

Summary

Interreg Euro-MED supports projects, initiatives and policies related to climate change and the environment in line with the priorities and specific objectives set out by the European Commission for the Cohesion policy. Four missions have been identified. They pull together different thematic issues and initiatives to reach goals that isolated projects could not reach otherwise. Each project has to contribute to one mission pursuing one of the specific objectives selected by the Programme.

- Test projects experiment common instruments, policies, strategies and action plans already developed to validate concrete solutions to be transferred.
- Transfer projects optimise and share validated common instruments, policies, strategies and actions plans to have the stakeholders adopt them.
- Strategic territorial projects conduct studies, test solutions and transfer results addressing the strategic topics of a specific typology of territories.

Each project implementing actions to fulfil the selected specific objective contributes to one of the 4 Programme missions that tackle challenges of greater importance.

Governance projects consist of 2 categories:

- Thematic Community projects facilitate the exchanges and the development of synergies between thematic projects. They develop technical knowledge embedding the results of the projects and strategies to support the effective transfer of their results to other territories or stakeholders.
- Institutional Dialogue projects support the effective cooperation of all stakeholders concerned by the Programme missions in the Mediterranean. They optimise the conditions for the transfer and the mainstreaming of the project results into practices and public policies to improve the governance at transnational level within and beyond the Programme area.

Summary

The cross-border cooperation programme between Serbia (RS) and Montenegro (ME) will be implemented under the framework of the 2021-2027 Instrument for Pre-accession Assistance (IPA III) with a view to promoting good neighbourly relations, fostering Union integration and promoting socio-economic development through joint local

and regional initiatives. The cross-border cooperation programme Serbia – Montenegro 2021-2027 is the third generation of the cross-border cooperation programmes between the two countries and is supported by the Instrument for Pre-accession Assistance of the European Union.

Priorities

The cross-border cooperation programme Serbia – Montenegro 2021-2027 is the third generation of the cross-border cooperation programmes between the two countries and is supported by the Instrument for Pre-accession Assistance of the European Union. It has incorporated the lessons learnt under the implementation of the 2014-2020 cross-border cooperation programme with the same participating countries to further strengthen and extend the scope of cooperation between beneficiaries. The programme was designed on the major findings of the situation and SWOT analyses.

Considering the identified needs and challenges of the programme area, the lessons learned from the previous period as well as the available financial envelope, the programme shall address two thematic priorities (TP):

- TP1: Employment, labour mobility and social and cultural inclusion across borders

An intensive process of structural transformation of the social and demographic structure of the programme area is ongoing. The younger population and the young families are moving toward the urban poles (both inside countries and abroad). The population is ageing and thus the decline of the number of active persons in the rural and remote areas is changing the needs and the socio-economic potential of these areas. This thematic priority is highly relevant since it combines important conditions for the improvement of the quality of life of people in the programme area by provision of upgraded health and social services in accordance with an inclusive society. Cross-border activity in these fields has been increasing in the last years and with this programme such a trend is expected to accelerate.

- TP2: Encouraging tourism and cultural and natural heritage

The programme area, as one of the most culturally diverse, and its exceptional nature values provide good

potential for the development of sustainable tourism. Activation of the natural, cultural and human potentials of the programme area for sustainable, green and inclusive tourism was recognised as one of the key areas of cooperation where significant improvements and

increase in the gross value added are meant to be made in the long-term perspective, and where a variety of different stakeholders and community lead organisations are actively called to participate.








Summary

The European Urban Initiative is an important tool to **support cities of all sizes, build capacity and knowledge, foster innovation and develop transferable and scalable innovative solutions to urban challenges of EU relevance**.

Under the first funding approach, **innovative and experimental sustainable urban development** measures and projects will be supported. Thematically, these must be closely linked to current challenges agreed by the Commission, Member States and associations of cities in the framework of the EU Urban Agenda. In addition, the transfer

of already tested innovative solutions to other cities is to be promoted.

In the second strand, **knowledge on sustainable urban development will be shared and used**. Therefore, the cooperation of the cities participating in the networks will be supported, for example through peer learning activities. This will also further develop the EU Urban Agenda and support intergovernmental cooperation on urban issues. A network of urban contact points will be established in EU Member States to facilitate work at local, regional and national level.

Priorities

In times of rapid urbanisation, Europe is increasingly facing major urban challenges ranging from the global health crisis and increasing digitalisation to social inequalities, demographic change, climate change and environmental degradation. To address these pressing challenges, cities in the EU need to transform and adapt to **develop their creative and innovative potential within their competences, financial resources and capacities**.

As part of this transformative perspective for cities, the EUI, funded by the European Union, supports urban areas of all sizes with innovative actions, capacity and knowledge building, and policy development and communication on sustainable urban development.

The legal basis of the European Urban Initiative is contained in Article 12 of [Regulation \(EU\) 2021/1058](#) of the European Parliament and of the Council of 24 June 2021 on the European Regional Development Fund and the Cohesion Fund (hereinafter the ERDF/CF Regulation), which sets out the main content and strategic framework of the initiative. The general objectives of the EUI are

- Strengthening integrated and participatory approaches to sustainable urban development; and
- To establish stronger links with EU policies, in particular cohesion policy.

The initiative aims to provide coherent support to cities in order to overcome the current fragmented landscape of multiple initiatives, programmes and instruments supporting

cities under Cohesion Policy. Within its strategic approach, the EUI covers all urban areas, including large, small and medium-sized cities („cities of all sizes“) as well as functional urban areas. It supports the EU Urban Agenda and, at the request of one or more Member States, the EUI can support intergovernmental cooperation on urban issues. In this context, the aim is to create additional effective links and synergies between the activities of the EUI and the EU Urban Agenda and intergovernmental cooperation.

The European Urban Initiative comprises two strands:

- Supporting innovative actions; and
- Supporting capacity building and knowledge, territorial impact assessments, policy development and communication.

European Urban Initiative - Innovative Actions (EUI-IA)

The European Urban Initiative is an important tool to support cities of all sizes, build capacity and knowledge, foster innovation and develop transferable and scalable innovative solutions to urban challenges of EU relevance.

EUI-IA offers two levels of support:

- **Funding for the testing and transfer of your innovative urban solution.** EUI-IA co-finances up to 80% of your project's activities and can provide you with up to €5 million from the European Regional Development Fund (ERDF) for the implementation of your project;
- **Capture, share and disseminate the knowledge your project generates.** The EUI is interested in understanding what worked and what did not work in the implementation of the innovative solution in order to learn lessons, capture the knowledge and share it with urban decision-makers and practitioners across Europe. Therefore, after the implementation of the innovative measures, the EUI will collect and share the results of the project trials. This will feed into transfer activities, with the aim of fostering innovation capacity and knowledge building for all urban areas in the EU and incorporating innovative solutions into sustainable urban development.

On the basis of calls for proposals, projects are selected according to the following criteria:

Innovative

Innovative actions support pilot projects that have not yet been tested anywhere else in Europe. Such projects are highly experimental and therefore risky and are therefore unlikely to be funded through traditional or conventional funding sources. The innovative nature of the proposed solution can be understood as an evolutionary approach, where the innovation lies in the new elements added to the existing idea, or as a revolutionary approach with completely new solutions that have never been tested before in the relevant policy area in the EU.

Participatory

The partnership must be relevant to addressing the identified urban challenges and implementing the proposed solution. Participation and co-design with partners, relevant stakeholders and target groups are key to the development and implementation of truly innovative and experimental projects.

Measurable

The innovative actions implemented must be measurable in order to draw meaningful conclusions regarding the added value of the project in the policy area concerned. A sound methodology is needed to measure the expected impact, as well as clear and quantified results to capture the expected change in the local situation as a result of the project.

Transferable and scalable

The selected solutions address urban problems that may be relevant to other urban authorities in Europe and transferable to other local contexts. Based on the lessons learned from the project and shared with a wider audience of policy makers and practitioners, the innovative actions have the potential to be scaled up and transferred to other urban areas in Europe.

Of good quality

Proposals for innovative actions must be sound and ready to be implemented. They must prove to be justified, realistic, consistent and coherent. They should also be able to be managed efficiently and implemented quickly and offer good value for money.

These perspectives aim to: Better and more effective management of processes and procedures; Better cooperation in the context of Interreg; and Improving the evidence base and visibility of Interreg. Building on the experience of promoting cooperation and coordination between different actors in the implementation of MRS and more recently SBS, Interact intends to continue to support the existing territorial framework programmes, their actors and their outward orientation whenever they benefit Interreg and promote cooperation as an effective policy tool. This includes capacity building approaches, staff exchange methods, cooperation models and experiences for actors inside and outside Interreg.

Priorities

Increasing efficiency: strengthening the management capacity of Interreg programmes and other cooperation actors

- Harmonisation of approaches focusing on interpretation and harmonisation of rules, information flows and procedures for Interreg programmes from different sectors and other cooperation actors in line with Interact's mandate, including harmonisation pilots (e.g. harmonisation of procedures such as ongoing reporting and project changes, business intelligence dashboard,

capitalisation toolkit) to support cooperation activities as mentioned above;

- Simplification of approaches followed in the structures for Interreg programmes in the rules & procedures for programme/project management & information flows, and through pilot processes in the cooperation actions mentioned above;
- Efficient programme management to support leaner management, clearer delineation of roles and responsibilities, better internal communication and transparency of processes.

Empowerment of individuals: Strengthening capacity to work in cooperation programmes and contexts

- Institutional knowledge and competence to support the learning and development of those working in Interreg programmes and cooperation contexts in general. The aim is to develop the skills to better manage the implementation of programmes and projects and to strengthen the skills and expertise to find new ways of managing cooperation and to develop synergies between programmes/funding instruments;
- Strengthen cooperation and coordination skills between stakeholders of Interreg programmes (including EGTC actors) and those stakeholders involved in the management and implementation of territorial governance frameworks and initiatives such as MRS and SBS. The pilot actions will also be aligned with the objective of the IJG;

- Innovative approaches: Support actions to promote innovative tools and methods in a cooperation context and for cooperation purposes.

Interreg Visibility: Strengthening the capacity to collect and communicate programme and project results and to increase visibility

- Building and collecting thematic knowledge and awareness of results, aggregating and analysing Interreg results and promoting coordination and capitalisation as a mainstream management process in programmes;
- Communicating results, aiming at integrating communication into the programme life cycle, communicating and promoting results and building knowledge about what to promote and to whom;
- Visibility of Interreg: This is about promoting strategic communication, the use of joint initiatives to reach relevant stakeholders, the overall visibility of Interreg in relevant fora and the design of cooperation processes.



37% of the overall financial allocation of the Cohesion Fund are expected to contribute to climate objectives.

The Interregional Innovation Investment Instrument, as part of the European Regional Development Fund (ERDF), aims to support interregional innovation projects in their

commercialisation and scaling-up phase and provide them with the tools to overcome regulatory and other obstacles and bring their project to investment level.

Priorities

The I3 instrument work programme aims to foster innovation through smart specialisation and interregional cooperation. The I3 instrument supports greater interregional cooperation on investments and creates sustainable linkages by connecting regional ecosystems in common areas of smart specialisation, which are crucial for accelerating market uptake of research results and stimulating innovation. Therefore, the focus is on the following areas:

Action Line 1 - Financial and advisory support for investments in interregional innovation projects

Action Line 1 targets mature partnerships to support them in accelerating market uptake and scaling innovative solutions in common focus areas of smart specialisation and in developing a portfolio of investment projects.

Action Line 2a - Financial and advisory support for value chain development in less developed regions

Summary

The EU Civil Protection Mechanism aims to put in place a reinforced and more ambitious crisis management system within the EU. It also aims to support, coordinate or

supplement the actions of EU Member States in the prevention of, preparedness for, and response to disasters.

Priorities

Civil protection assistance consists of governmental aid delivered in the immediate aftermath of a disaster. This emergency relief can take the form of in-kind assistance, deployment of specially-equipped teams, or assessment and coordination by experts sent to the field.

Disasters know no borders and a well-coordinated response at European level is necessary to avoid duplication of relief efforts and ensure that assistance meets the real needs of the affected region.

When a country is hit by a disaster, which overwhelms its response capacity, European countries can provide assistance via the EU Civil Protection Mechanism. The Mechanism was established in 2001 to foster cooperation among national civil protection authorities across Europe. It enables a more rapid and effective response to emergencies by coordinating the delivery of civil protection teams and assets to the affected country and population.

Via the Mechanism, the European Commission supports and complements the prevention and preparedness efforts of participating states, focusing on areas where a joint European approach is more effective than separate national actions.

In this context each year, the European Commission publishes calls for proposals to fund activities aimed at promoting and encouraging cooperation in prevention, preparedness and awareness-raising activities in civil protection and marine pollution.

Following a request for assistance through the Mechanism, the [Emergency Response Coordination Centre \(ERCC\)](#) mobilises assistance or expertise. The ERCC monitors events around the globe 24/7 and ensures rapid deployment of emergency support through a direct link with national civil protection authorities. Specialised teams and equipment, such as firefighting planes, search and rescue and medical

teams, can be mobilised at short notice for deployments inside and outside of Europe.

Any country in the world, but also the United Nations and its agencies or a relevant international organisation, can call on the EU Civil Protection Mechanism for help. In 2022, the Mechanism was activated 106 times to respond to (i) war in Ukraine; (ii) wildfires in Europe; (iii) COVID-19 in Europe and worldwide; and (iv) floods in Pakistan. Additionally, Member States and participating states can also activate the Mechanism to seek assistance for [consular support](#) to their citizens (e.g., in the context of evacuation operations).

In 2019, the EU upgraded the EU Civil Protection Mechanism and created rescEU. The aim was to protect citizens from disasters and manage emerging risks. Fully financed by the EU, rescEU strengthens European preparedness for disasters and boosts the capacity to respond to crises in Europe. Such

as wildfires, medical emergencies, chemical, biological, radiological, and nuclear incidents, shelter needs, emergency transportation, and electricity supplies.

Prevention and preparedness activities mitigate the effects of disasters. A [training](#) programme for civil protection experts from EU Member States and participating states ensures compatibility and complementarity between intervention teams, while large-scale exercises train capacities for specific disasters each year. The EU supports and complements prevention and preparedness efforts of its Member States and participating states by focusing on areas where a joint European approach is more effective than separate national actions. These include risk assessments to identify the disaster risks across the EU, encouraging research to promote disaster resilience and reinforcing early warning tools.

The EU4Health programme was launched in response to the COVID 19 pandemic and aims to strengthen the EU's crisis preparedness. The pandemic demonstrated the vulnerability of our national health systems. The programme aims to make health systems stronger, more resilient and more accessible to address long-term health threats.

Improving and promoting health in the EU

- Health promotion and disease prevention, especially for cancer;
- Health initiatives and cooperation at international level.

Protecting people

- Prevention, preparedness and rapid response to cross-border health threats;
- Supplementing national stockpiles with essential crisis-related products;

- Establishment of a reserve of medical, health and support staff.

Access to medicines, medical devices and crisis-related products

- Ensuring that these products are accessible, available and affordable.

Strengthening health systems

- Improving health data, digital tools and services; digitising health systems;
- Facilitating access to healthcare;
- Developing and enforcing EU health law and evidence-based decision-making;
- Coordination between national health systems.

Priorities

EU4Health will pave the way to a [European Health Union](#) by investing in urgent health priorities:

- [Response to the COVID-19 crisis](#) and reinforcing the EU's resilience for [cross-border health threats](#);
- [Europe's Beating Cancer Plan](#);
- [Pharmaceutical Strategy for Europe](#).

Other areas, such as health systems' [digitalisation](#), reducing the number of [antimicrobial-resistant infections](#) and improving [vaccination](#) rates will also be boosted.

The EU will expand successful initiatives like the [European Reference Networks](#) for rare diseases and continue to pursue [international cooperation](#) on global health threats and challenges.

EU4Health is implemented by [annual Work Programmes](#) supporting a broad range of actions that are clustered under four overarching 'strands' with a cross-cutting focus on cancer.

- Crisis preparedness;
- Health promotion and disease prevention;

- Health systems and healthcare workforce
- Digital.

The programme provides funding to eligible entities, health organisations and NGOs from EU countries, or non-EU countries associated to the programme.

Summary

The European Social Fund+ (ESF+) is the European Union's (EU) main instrument for investing in people. With a budget of almost €99.3 billion for the period 2021-2027, the ESF+ will continue to make an important contribution to policies and reforms in the fields of employment, social affairs, education and skills.

Objectives of the ESF+:

- **Equality for women and men** - incl. innovative childcare services;
- **Active ageing** - incl. digitalisation issues;
- Active inclusion - improving professional participation;
- Support for **young people** in schools and at the transition from school to education and work;
- Access to **lifelong learning** - incl. digital competences;
- **Social innovation**;
- **Just Transition Fund** in specific regions particularly

Priorities


- **Invest in young people** who have been hit particularly hard by the socio-economic crisis following the Corona virus outbreak. Member States above the EU average in terms of the proportion of young people not in employment, education or training (the so-called „NEETs“, aged 15-29) should devote at least 12.5% of their ESF+ funding to helping these young people find a qualification or a quality job. All other Member States must allocate an appropriate amount of their ESF+ funds to targeted actions to support youth employment measures.
- **Support the most vulnerable people** suffering from job losses and income cuts: Member States must allocate at least 25% of their ESF+ funds to support social inclusion.
- **Provide food and basic material assistance to the most vulnerable** by integrating the current Fund for European Aid to the Most Deprived (FEAD) into the ESF+. All

Member States will devote at least 3% of their ESF+ funds to this objective. •

- **Invest in measures for children** who have suffered from the effects of the crisis. Member States where the level of child poverty is above the EU average should devote at least 5% of their ESF+ funds to tackling this problem. All other Member States must allocate an appropriate amount of their ESF Plus funds to targeted measures to tackle child poverty.
- **Contribute to the green and digital transformation**, with investment in skills opportunities for workers in a climate-neutral, digital and inclusive society.
- **Directly support social innovation**, social entrepreneurship and cross-border labour mobility through the new Employment and Social Innovation (EaSI) strand of ESF Plus, with earmarked funding of €676 million. EaSI will support analytical activities, capacity

building and transnational/cross-border cooperation to strengthen social protection and inclusion, fair working

conditions and equal access to the labour market and improve labour mobility.

Summary

Erasmus+ 2021-2027 is the EU's programme for **education, training, youth and sport**, which are key areas for supporting citizens in their personal and professional development. High-quality, inclusive education, training, informal and non-formal learning ultimately equip young people of all ages with the qualifications and skills they need for meaningful participation in democratic society, intercultural understanding and a successful transition to the labour market. Spending time in another country to study, learn and work should become the norm, while speaking two languages in addition to one's mother tongue should be the norm.

The general objective of the programme is to **support, through lifelong learning, the educational, vocational and personal development of people** in education, training, youth and sport in Europe and beyond, thereby contributing to sustainable growth, quality employment and social

cohesion, fostering innovation and strengthening European identity and active citizenship.

The specific objectives of the programme are:

- To promote individual and group mobility **for learning purposes**, as well as cooperation, quality, inclusion and equal opportunities, excellence, creativity and innovation at organisational and policy levels in education and training;
- To promote **non-formal and informal learning mobility** and active participation of young people, as well as cooperation, quality, inclusion, creativity and innovation at the level of organisations and policies in the youth field;
- Promoting the **learning mobility of those active in sport**, as well as cooperation, quality, inclusion, creativity and innovation at the level of organisations and policies in the field of sport.

Priorities

Inclusion and diversity

The Programme aims to increase the qualitative impact of its actions and to ensure **equal opportunities**. To this end, the Programme will target people of different ages and cultural, social and economic backgrounds. It will focus on people with fewer opportunities, including those with disabilities, educational difficulties or migrant backgrounds, as well as those living in rural and remote areas.

Digital transformation

In line with the priorities of the [Digital Education Action Plan](#), the programme will develop **accessible and high-quality digital learning**, support the capacity of teachers, trainers, youth workers, etc. to use digital tools and content, and test and promote distance and blended learning. The programme's mobility actions will increase opportunities to acquire and develop digital skills through initiatives such as

the [Digital Opportunity Traineeships programme](#). The implementation of the programme will be significantly digitised and simplified for participants, in particular through the [European Student Card initiative](#) and a redesigned IT architecture for beneficiaries and implementing bodies

Environment and combating climate change

In line with the [European Green Deal](#), the programme will lead by example by encouraging participants to use lower carbon transport as an alternative to flying. Erasmus funding will also be used to increase knowledge and understanding of **sustainability and climate change**, so that Europeans can acquire the world-leading skills needed to create sustainable societies, lifestyles and economies.

Participation in democratic life

The programme addresses the limited participation of citizens in their democratic processes and their lack of knowledge about the European Union, and seeks to help them overcome the difficulties they face in becoming actively involved and participating in their communities or in the political and social life of the Union. **Strengthening citizens' understanding of the European Union** from an early age is crucial for the future of the Union.

Key Action 1 – Learning Mobility of Individuals

The focus is on **mobility** - going abroad - of learners, teachers, staff, young people and professionals in the field of education and youth. The aim is to achieve a positive and sustainable impact for participants and participating organisations. Mobility projects can be submitted by organisations working in the field of education and youth.

Activities funded under Key Action 1 are expected to have a positive and sustainable impact on the participants and participating organisations, as well as on the policy systems in which these activities are embedded.

The Erasmus+ programme reinforces the support offered to participants in mobility activities to **improve their language skills** before and during their stay abroad, including an additional language support grant for participants in long-term mobility in vocational education and training and school education. An Erasmus+ Online Language Support (OLS) service offers participants in mobility activities the possibility to check their competence in two languages and to participate in online language courses to improve their competence. In addition to online language courses, the OLS offers several other features, such as supported and blended learning tools that allow teachers and youth workers to provide additional support to their learners, and social networking features that enable collaborative learning.

In addition, Erasmus+ provides space for the development of mobility activities involving partner organisations from different backgrounds and working in different fields or socio-economic sectors (e.g. placements of higher education students or VET learners in enterprises, NGOs, public institutions; teachers from schools participating in professional development courses in enterprises or training centres; business experts giving lectures or training in higher education institutions, etc.).

A third important element for the innovation and quality of mobility activities is the possibility for Erasmus+ participating organisations to organise mobility activities within a **broader strategic framework and in the medium term**.

Accreditation schemes play an important role in ensuring a high impact of Key Action 1. The Erasmus Charter for Higher Education, the Erasmus Accreditation for Higher Education Mobility Consortia and the Erasmus Accreditations in Vocational Education and Training, School Education, Adult Education and Youth enable organisations to benefit from Key Action 1 on a continuous basis and to focus on longer-term objectives and institutional impact.

Key Action 2 – Cooperation among Organisations and Institutions

Support will be given to cooperation projects between organisations. These aim to exchange **good practice, use new technologies, develop innovative teaching and learning methods, support non-formal learning and develop common tools and activities** at local, regional, national or European level.

This Key Action supports:

- Partnerships for cooperation, including collaborative partnerships and small-scale partnerships;
- Partnerships for excellence, including Centres for Professional Excellence, Teachers Academy and Erasmus Mundus actions;
- Partnerships for innovation, including alliances and foresight projects;
- Youth capacity-building projects;
- European non-profit sport events.

For the participating organisations, projects funded under this key action should result in:

- **Innovative approaches to reaching their target groups**, such as more attractive education and training programmes that meet individual needs and expectations; use of participatory approaches and digital methods; new or improved ways of recognising and validating competences; greater effectiveness of

activities for the benefit of local communities; new or improved ways of meeting the needs of disadvantaged target groups and of addressing differences in learning outcomes linked to geographical and socio-economic differences; new ways of taking account of social, ethnic, linguistic and cultural diversity; new ways of better supporting competitiveness and employment, especially at regional and local level; recognition of excellence in language learning or teaching through the European Language Label.

- **A more modern, dynamic, committed and professional environment within the organisation:** ready to integrate best practices and new methodologies, including digital opportunities, into daily activities; open to synergies with organisations working in other fields or in other socio-economic sectors; strategic planning of staff professional development in line with individual needs and organisational objectives;
- **Increased capacity and professionalism** to work at EU/international level: improved management skills and internationalisation strategies; increased cooperation with partners from other countries, other fields of education, training and youth and/or other socio-economic sectors; increased allocation of funds (other than EU funds) for the organisation of EU/international projects in the field of education, training and youth; increased quality in the preparation, implementation, monitoring and follow-up of EU/international projects; monitoring and follow-up of EU/international projects;
- **Increased knowledge and awareness of sport and physical activity;**
- Increased awareness of the role of sport in promoting social inclusion, equal opportunities and healthy lifestyles.

Key Action 3 – Support to Policy Development and Cooperation

Key Action 3 supports policy cooperation at European Union level and contributes to the **development of new policies** that can trigger modernisation and reform at European Union and system level in the fields of education, training, youth and sport.

The activities carried out under this key action aim to:

- To prepare and support the implementation of the **EU policy agenda in the fields of education, training, youth and sport** by facilitating the governance and functioning of open methods of coordination;
- To carry out European policy experiments, led by high-level public authorities and involving field testing of

policies in several countries, based on sound evaluation methods.

- **Collect evidence and knowledge** on education, training, youth and sport systems and policies at national and European level to facilitate informed policy making;
- Facilitate **transparency** and recognition of skills and qualifications and transfer of credits to support quality assurance, validation of non-formal and informal learning, skills management and guidance;
- Promote **policy dialogue** with stakeholders within and outside the European Union through conferences, events and other activities involving policy makers, practitioners and other stakeholders in the fields of education, training, youth and sport, in order to raise awareness of relevant European policy agendas and to promote Europe as a centre of excellence for study and research;
- Improve the quality of the implementation of the Programme by facilitating the **transfer of knowledge and practice between National Agencies**, by providing **National Agencies** and the Commission with 'think tank' resources to enable the development of activities and strategies for the implementation of the Programme in a more coherent way with policy developments, and by providing tools to better exploit the potential for synergies and complementarities;
- **Provide opportunities for people at all stages of their lives to have a learning experience abroad** in their field of expertise, e.g. public administration, agriculture and rural development, new technologies, business, etc;
- Enable Erasmus+ Implementing Agencies to act as facilitators for the scaling-up of Erasmus+ projects to apply for funding or to develop synergies through support to the European Structural and Investment Funds managed at national and regional level, the Framework Programme for Research and Innovation, and programmes in the fields of migration, security, justice and citizenship, health and culture;
- Support events, campaigns and other activities to **inform citizens and organisations about the Erasmus+ programme** and European Union policies in the fields of education, training, youth and sport;
- Contribute to the identification and dissemination of good practice and success stories from the projects funded, in order to raise their profile and scale them up at local, national and European level.

Sport Actions

Erasmus+ actions in the field of sport promote participation in **sport, physical activity and voluntary activities**. They are designed to address societal and sport-related challenges. There are 3 calls for proposals for organisations to address these challenges. A specific call for capacity building in the

field of sport will also be available from 2022. It is open to EU Member States and third countries associated to the programme, as well as the countries of the Western Balkans.

Collaborative partnerships

Aimed at organisations that want to develop and implement joint activities to promote sport and physical activity, combat threats to the integrity of sport (e.g. doping or match-fixing), encourage dual careers for athletes, improve good governance and promote tolerance and social inclusion.

Smaller partnerships

For grassroots organisations, less experienced organisations and newcomers to the programme. Smaller partnerships have simpler administration, smaller grants and a shorter duration than collaborative partnerships.

European non-profit sport events

They aim to promote sporting activities, implement EU policies on social inclusion through sport, promote volunteering in sport, combat discrimination and encourage participation in sport and physical activity.

Capacity building in sport

Capacity building projects are international cooperation projects based on multilateral partnerships between organisations active in the field of sport in EU Member States and third countries associated to the Programme (formerly known as Programme Countries), as well as in the Western Balkans. They aim to support sporting activities and actions as a means of promoting values and as an educational tool for the personal and social development of individuals and for building more cohesive communities.

Jean Monnet Actions

The Jean Monnet Actions are expected to produce the following main results:


- Promote knowledge and awareness of European Union affairs;

Multiannual Financial Framework - Heading: Cohesion and Values
Cluster: Investing in People, Social Cohesion & Values

Summary

The Justice Programme is running from 2021 to 2027. It provides funding to support judicial cooperation in civil and criminal matters such as training to judges and other legal practitioners and effective access to justice for citizens and businesses. It contributes to the further development of a European area of justice based on the rule of law, including

independence and impartiality of the judiciary, on mutual recognition, mutual trust and judicial cooperation. It is strengthening democracy, rule of law, and fundamental rights. This programme forms part of a new Justice, Rights and Values Fund together with the [Citizens, Equality, Rights and Values programme](#).

Priorities

Judicial cooperation in civil and criminal matters

The objective of projects in this area is to facilitate and support judicial cooperation in civil and criminal matters, and to promote the rule of law, independence and impartiality of the judiciary, including by supporting the efforts to improve the effectiveness of national justice systems, and the effective enforcement of decisions; they should achieve these results:

- increased capacity of national practitioners, authorities to address issues related to judicial cooperation, and to the application of the Union instruments;
- strengthened cooperation and exchange of information between competent national authorities in relation to judicial cooperation in civil matters, including taking into account the relevant case-law of the Court of Justice of the European Union;
- increased awareness of legal practitioners and policy makers.

Judicial training

The objective of projects in this area is to support and promote judicial training, with a view to fostering a common legal, judicial and rule of law culture, as well as the consistent and effective implementation of the Union's legal instruments relevant to civil law, criminal law and fundamental rights, to judicial ethics and the rule of law, by covering training needs' gaps in these fields; they should achieve these results:

- Increased knowledge of EU civil, criminal and fundamental rights instruments among legal practitioners;
- Improved mutual trust between legal practitioners in cross-border judicial cooperation;
- Improved cooperation of training providers of the different legal professions.

Effective access to justice in Europe, including rights of victims of crime and procedural rights in criminal proceedings

The objective of projects in this area is to facilitate effective and non-discriminatory access to justice for all, and effective redress, including by electronic means (e-justice), by promoting efficient civil, and criminal procedures, and by promoting and supporting the rights of all victims of crime as well as the procedural rights of suspects and accused persons in criminal proceedings.

The Justice programme also supports the maintenance and extension of the [e-Justice portal](#) which includes useful documents and databases to facilitate access to justice for citizens (e.g. the information on cross-border legal proceedings, rights of victims of crime or defendants in legal proceedings, family law, the Find a Lawyer and Find a Notary interfaces) and businesses (e.g. Interconnected insolvency registers search engines, Business registers, European Payment Order forms and land registers databases, the information on monetary claims and legal professions).

Multiannual Financial Framework - Heading: Cohesion and Values Cluster: Investing in People, Social Cohesion & Values

Summary

The Citizens, Equality, Rights and Values (CERV) programme was launched in 2021 and will run for seven years until 2027. It was established together with the Justice 2021-2027 programme under the Justice, Rights and Values Fund.

The aim of the CERV programme is to **support and develop open, rights-based, democratic, equal and inclusive societies based on the rule of law**. This includes a vibrant and empowered civil society that fosters people's democratic, civic and social participation and cultivates the rich diversity of European society based on our shared values, history and memory.

The CERV programme consists of four pillars:

- **Equality, Rights and Gender Equality** - promoting rights, non-discrimination, equality (including gender equality)

and promoting gender mainstreaming and non-discrimination;

- **Citizenship and participation** - promoting citizenship and participation in the democratic life of the Union, exchanges between citizens of different Member States and raising awareness of the common European story;
- **Daphne** - Fight against violence, including gender-based violence and violence against children;
- **Union values** - protecting and promoting the values of the Union.

Civil society organisations operating at local, regional, national and transnational level, as well as other stakeholders, can apply for CERV funding for initiatives that promote civic participation, equality for all, and the protection and promotion of EU rights and values.

Priorities

Equality, Rights & Gender Pillar

- Promote equality and prevent and combat inequality and discrimination based on sex, racial or ethnic origin, religion or belief, disability, age or sexual orientation, and respect the prohibition of discrimination on the grounds set out in Article 21 of the [Charter](#);
- Support, promote and implement comprehensive strategies;
- Promote women's full enjoyment of rights, gender equality, including reconciliation of work and family life,

women's empowerment in society and gender mainstreaming;

- Promote non-discrimination and its mainstreaming;
- Combating racism, xenophobia and all forms of intolerance, both online and offline, including homophobia, biphobia, transphobia, interphobia and intolerance based on gender identity;
- Protect and promote the rights of the child;
- Protecting and promoting the rights of persons with disabilities.

- Protecting and promoting the rights of European citizenship and the right to the protection of personal data.

Civic Participation & Involvement Pillar

- Support projects aimed at commemorating key moments in recent and contemporary European history, such as the rise of authoritarian and totalitarian regimes, including their causes and consequences, and projects aimed at raising the awareness of the Union's citizens of their common history and culture, heritage and values, thereby improving their level of information about the Union, its origins, purpose, diversity and achievements, and the importance of mutual understanding and tolerance;
- Promote the participation of citizens and representative associations in, and their contribution to, the democratic and civic life of the Union by giving them the opportunity to make known and publicly exchange their views in all areas of the Union's activity;
- Encourage exchanges between citizens of different countries, in particular through town-twinning and town-networking schemes, so that they can experience the richness and diversity of the Union's common heritage and realise that this richness and diversity form a solid basis for a common future.

Daphne Pillar

- Prevent and combat all forms of gender-based violence against women and girls and domestic violence at all levels, including by promoting the standards set out in the Council of Europe Convention on Preventing and Combating Violence against Women and Domestic Violence ([Istanbul Convention](#));
- Preventing and combating all forms of violence against children and young people and other vulnerable groups such as LGBTIQ persons and persons with disabilities;
- Support and protect all direct and indirect victims of the forms of violence referred to in points 1 and 2, such as victims of domestic violence within the family or in close relationships, including children orphaned as a result of crimes committed within the family, and to support and ensure a consistent level of protection for victims of gender-based violence across the Union.

Union Values Pillar

This pillar focuses on protecting and promoting rights and raising awareness of rights by providing financial support to civil society organisations that promote and defend these rights at local, regional, national and transnational levels, thereby also strengthening the protection and promotion of the Union's values and respect for the rule of law, and contributing to the building of a more democratic Union, democratic dialogue, transparency and good governance.

Multiannual Financial Framework - Heading: Cohesion and Values Cluster: Investing in People, Social Cohesion & Values

Summary

'Creative Europe' is the European Union's programme for the European cultural and creative sectors for the period 2021-2027. The programme brings together actions to support Europe's **cultural and creative sectors**, i.e. all sectors whose activities are based on cultural values and artistic and other

individual or collective creative expressions, regardless of whether these activities are market or non-market oriented, what type of structure carries them out and how that structure is financed.

Priorities

Activities include the development, creation, production, dissemination and preservation of goods and services embodying cultural, artistic or other creative expressions, as well as related functions such as education or management. Many of them have the potential to **generate innovation and jobs**, in particular through intellectual property. Sectors include architecture, archives, libraries and museums, arts and crafts, audiovisual (including film, television, video games and multimedia), tangible and intangible cultural heritage, design (including fashion design), festivals, music, literature, performing arts (including theatre and dance), books and publishing, broadcasting and visual arts.

The programme builds on and continues the structure of its predecessor for the period 2014-2020. The overall objectives of Creative Europe are:

- **To protect, develop and promote Europe's cultural and linguistic diversity and heritage;**
- **To increase the competitiveness and economic potential of the cultural and creative sectors, in particular the audiovisual sector.**

These objectives will be pursued through the following specific objectives:

- Improving artistic and cultural cooperation at European level in order to support the creation of European works and to strengthen the economic, social and external dimension as well as innovation and mobility of the European cultural and creative sectors (**Culture strand**);
- Promote competitiveness, scalability, cooperation, innovation and sustainability, including through mobility, in the European audiovisual sector (**Media strand**); and

- Fostering policy cooperation and innovative actions in support of all the strands of the programme, promoting a diverse, independent and pluralistic media environment and media literacy, thus fostering freedom of artistic expression, intercultural dialogue and social inclusion (**Cross-sectoral strand**).

The general and specific objectives of Creative Europe take into account the dual nature of the cultural and creative sectors, recognising both the intrinsic and artistic value of culture and the economic value of these sectors, including their wider contribution to growth and competitiveness, creativity and innovation. The objectives shall be pursued in a way that promotes inclusion, equality, diversity and participation, including, where appropriate, specific incentives to encourage the active participation of people with disabilities, people belonging to minorities and people belonging to socially marginalised groups in the cultural and creative sectors, including the creative process and audience development, as well as gender equality, in particular as a driver of economic growth, innovation and creativity.

Creative Europe - Culture Strand (CREA-CULT)

Cultural funding under the EU's Creative Europe 2021-2027 programme covers the entire arts, culture and creative sector. Funding is available for transnational cooperation projects, European networks and platforms, literary translation, mobility of arts and culture professionals and sector-specific activities.

The Culture strand of the Creative Europe programme supports a wide range of cultural and creative sectors, including **Architecture, Cultural heritage, Design, Literature and publishing, Music and Performing arts**.

The Culture strand promotes cooperation and exchange between cultural organizations and artists in Europe and beyond. It aims to:

- Promote artistic creation and innovation;
- Support the promotion and dissemination of European content in Europe and beyond;
- Help artists find cross-border creation and performance opportunities;
- Promote the digital and environmental transformation of the European cultural and creative sectors.
- The Culture strand includes the following actions:
- Horizontal actions for all areas of the cultural and creative sectors: support for cultural cooperation projects, networks of professional associations, platforms for the promotion of European artists and works, and individual mobility programs.
- Sector-specific support to complement horizontal measures in the fields of music, publishing, cultural heritage and architecture, among others.

- Specific measures to reward and promote excellence and creativity, including prizes for literature, music, architecture and heritage, the [European Capitals of Culture action](#) and the [European Heritage Label](#).

Creative Europe - Media Strand (CREA-MEDIA)

The Media strand of the Creative Europe programme supports the European **film and audiovisual industry** in the development, distribution and promotion of European works, taking into account today's **digital environment**.

The Media strand of the Creative Europe programme

- Encourages collaboration across the audiovisual industry value chain and at EU level to promote companies and European content worldwide;
- Nurtures talent - no matter where it comes from;
- Appeals to audiences of all ages, especially younger generations.

To ensure more flexibility in the actions supported and to encourage collaboration between the different parts of the audiovisual value chain, the priorities of the Creative Europe 2021-2027 program are divided into four clusters: **Content, Business, Audience and Policy Support**

Content cluster: The creation and production of high quality content is the basis of the European audiovisual industry. European content reflects European values, including diversity. European talent and creativity continue to produce works that are recognised and rewarded on the world stage. This cluster aims to help the industry to:

- Promote the transnational circulation of European audiovisual works;
- Adapt content for new audiences and platforms;
- Adopt more robust business models to cope with production costs and increasing competition.

Business clusters: The Business Cluster under the Media strand of Creative Europe supports entrepreneurial innovation, scalability and talent across the European audiovisual industry value chain. This scalability is needed in the audiovisual environment, given the growth of global players in the sector and the digital transformation. Specific groups driving the internationalisation of the sector will receive targeted support to strengthen cross-border cooperation and promote learning and knowledge sharing to enable the industry to move beyond its national borders. Support through the cluster will:

- Develop talent in the audiovisual sector through activities with a strong focus on mentoring and digital and green skills;
- Encourage business-to-business exchanges covering all parts of the value chain and aiming for global reach;

- Encourage transnational distribution of content across borders and platforms.

Audience clusters: the COVID 19 crisis has had a dramatic impact on the audiovisual viewing habits of European audiences. The gradual shift from cinema to platforms that the sector has been experiencing over the last year has been greatly accelerated by the closure of cinemas. The aim of this cluster of the Media strand is to connect European audiovisual works with their audiences and to support audience development across Europe and beyond. The programme will achieve this by:

- Stimulating audience growth and renewal by increasing audiences on all platforms;
- Targeting younger audiences through a variety of educational/promotional tools;
- Ensuring access to content by supporting subtitling.

Policy Support Cluster: A common European approach to key audiovisual policy issues is essential for the consolidation of the European audiovisual internal market. The aim of the Policy Support Cluster of the MEDIA strand is to promote a holistic European audiovisual policy by:

- Regulatory dialogue;
- Sharing analyses/data;
- Anticipatory information on trends;
- Consultation with stakeholders;
- Public relations and outreach activities.

Particular priorities in this cluster are

- Fully exploiting the opportunities of digital transformation in the implementation of projects
- Promoting the greening of the sector and promoting inclusion, equality, diversity and participation.

Creative Europe - Cross-Sectoral Strand (CREA-CROSS)

For the first time, Creative Europe is offering funding to the news media sector to promote **media literacy, pluralism and freedom**, as well as activities to help the sector adapt to the structural and technological changes it is facing.

In 2021, Creative Europe has launched a call for proposals for partnerships in journalism.

The action aims to:

- Encourage cross-industry, cross-border cooperation between news media professionals in Europe;
- Stimulate the exchange of best practices for collaborative business transformation;
- Encourage journalistic cooperation through the development of standards, new business models, training programmes, funding schemes and other activities to promote quality journalism.

The support is aimed at the **entire European news media sector**, including small media.

Through the Creative Innovation Lab action, Creative Europe aims to promote innovative approaches to content creation, access, distribution and promotion in the cultural, creative and other sectors. These approaches should take into account digital transformation and cover both market and non-market dimensions.

The **Creative Innovation Lab** aims to:

- Encourage stakeholders from different cultural and creative sectors to develop and test innovative digital solutions with long-term positive impact;
- Facilitate the development of innovative, market-ready tools, models and methodologies for the audiovisual sector and at least one other creative or cultural sector.

Creative Europe Desks shall have the following tasks:

- Provide information on and promote the Creative Europe programme in their country;
- Support the cultural and creative sector in relation to the Programme and provide basic information on other funding opportunities;
- Promote transnational cooperation within the cultural and creative sector;
- Support the cultural and creative sectors in the participating countries;
- Assist the Commission in ensuring appropriate communication and dissemination of the results and impact of the Programme;
- Ensure the exchange and dissemination of information on the funding awarded to a participating country and the results achieved there.

Multiannual Financial Framework - Heading: Neighbourhood & the World Cluster: External Actions

Summary

The new Neighbourhood, Development and International Cooperation Instrument (NDICI)-Global Europe merges several former EU external financing instruments. It aims to support countries most in need to overcome long-term

developmental challenges and will contribute to achieving the international commitments and objectives that the Union has agreed to, in particular the 2030 Agenda and its Sustainable Development Goals and the Paris Agreement.

Priorities

The NDICI-Global Europe instrument unifies grants, blending and guarantees (the latter previously subject to specific rules and regulations, such as the EIB's External Lending Mandate), which will allow the EU to strategically promote public and private investment worldwide in support to sustainable development through the European Fund for Sustainable Development Plus (EFSD+). Investments will be backed by an up to €53.4 billion External Action Guarantee, which will also cover the pre-accession countries.

The EU assistance is based on the European Neighbourhood Policy objectives and priorities outlined in the regional strategies, such as the renewed Eastern Partnership.

Partner countries, the EU and the Member States agree on the common priorities in the Joint Documents, which take the form of Partnership Priorities, Association Agendas or equivalent. They set further the political and economic priorities for EU financial assistance.

The European Neighbourhood Policy (ENP) governs the EU's relations with 6 of the EU's closest Eastern Neighbours: Armenia, Azerbaijan, Belarus, Georgia, Moldova and Ukraine.

Russia takes part in Cross-Border Cooperation activities under the ENP and is not a part of the ENP as such.

The ENP was launched in 2003 and developed throughout 2004, with the objective of avoiding the emergence of new dividing lines between the enlarged EU and its neighbours and instead strengthening the prosperity, stability and security of all. It is based on the values of democracy, rule of law and respect of human rights.

The ENP was reviewed in 2011, following the 'Arab Spring' uprisings, and again in 2015. However, given the significant developments in the Neighbourhood since 2011, it became essential to undertake a further review of the ENP. In this regard, a Joint Communication setting out the main lines of the review of the ENP has been published on 18 November 2015 following a public consultation, involving partner countries, international organisations, social partners, civil society and academia.

Under the revised ENP, stabilisation of the region, in political, economic, and security related terms, is at the heart of the new policy. Moreover, the revised ENP puts a strong emphasis on two principles: a differentiated approach, to

respect the different aspirations of our partners and to better answer EU interests and the interests of our partners; and an increased ownership by partner countries and Member States.

The Joint Communication on the "Eastern Partnership policy beyond 2020- Reinforcing Resilience- an Eastern Partnership that delivers for all", adopted on 18 March 2020, outlines the long-term policy objectives for future cooperation with Eastern Neighbourhood partners. It underlines how to address common challenges and sets out how the EU will work together with the partner countries in different policy areas in the future, with the aim to strengthen resilience, foster sustainable development and deliver concrete benefits to people.

For the period 2021-27, the EU defines its cooperation priority areas and specific objectives for most Neighbourhood partner countries and regions in **multi-annual indicative programmes**. These strategic documents are prepared in an inclusive dialogue and consultation with partner countries, EU Member States, civil society, women and youth organisations, local authorities, private sector and other donors. They contain indicative financial allocations, objectives, results and indicators (with baseline and targets) to measure EU intervention effectiveness. A mid-term review of those multi-annual indicative programmes is being carried out in 2025, in order to set the indicative financial allocations for the 2025-27 period and adjust, when necessary, the

priorities to the changing geopolitical context and to the evolving relation between the EU and the partner countries.

Until 2024, the European Commission would adopt **Annual Action Plans** setting out how the implementation of these programmes. For the 2025-27 period, the Commission will adopt multi-annual Action Plans aimed to support key policies and reforms providing for sustainable socio-economic growth. For those Neighbourhood countries where there are no adopted Joint documents nor multi-annual indicative programmes, the Commission will adopt **special measures**.

The European Commission is also supporting countries in the process of accession, through different facilities. It notably established the [Ukraine Facility](#) (covering 2024-2027) funded outside the NDICI-GE instrument and will establish the [Moldova Facility](#) in 2025 (covering 2025-27), from NDICI-GE funding.

The ENP review established revised joint priorities for cooperation. They are better suited to the challenges of our time and adapted to the region's evolutions. In addition to good governance, democracy, rule of law and human rights, three other sets of joint priorities have been identified, each of them covering a wide number of cooperation sectors:

- economic development for stabilisation;
- the security dimension; and
- migration and mobility.

**Multiannual Financial Framework - Heading: Neighbourhood & the World
Cluster: External Actions**

Summary

To help Ukraine in its recovery, reconstruction and modernisation efforts, the EU has launched a new support mechanism for the years 2024 to 2027. The Ukraine Facility is a dedicated instrument which will allow the EU to provide Ukraine with **up to €50 billion** in stable and predictable financial support during this period.

The Facility underlines the EU's commitment to supporting Ukraine in the face of Russia's ongoing war of aggression and on its path towards EU membership.

Priorities

The key objectives of the Ukraine Facility are to:

- **Support recovery, reconstruction, and modernisation** – rebuild vital infrastructure, revitalise the economy, and enhance societal resilience.
- **Support reforms on the way to EU accession** – by providing assistance and incentives for reforms implementation, the EU aims to facilitate Ukraine's alignment with European standards and values.
- **Support financing needs** – ensuring the continuity of essential services even in the face of war and economic strain.
- **Mobilise investments** – facilitating investment flows to catalyse rapid economic recovery and sustainable growth, laying the groundwork for long-term prosperity.
- **Support Ukrainian society** – mitigating the humanitarian impact of the war and promoting social cohesion and inclusivity within Ukrainian society.

The Facility is organised around three pillars:

Pillar I: Support to Ukraine through the Ukraine Plan

This pillar entails the provision of financial assistance to Ukraine, totalling **€38.27 billion**. Comprising both **grants (€5.27 billion) and loans (€33 billion)**, this stream of support aims at addressing the financial needs of the Ukrainian State to maintain macro-financial stability while support reforms and investments aimed at the recovery, reconstruction and modernisation of Ukraine.

Funds under this Pillar of the Facility will be provided based on the successful implementation of the **Ukraine Plan**, with disbursements scheduled quarterly. In 2024, the Commission made two regular payments under the Ukraine Facility: **€4.2 billion** in August and **€4.1 billion** in December. In 2025, a third payment of **€3.5 billion** was disbursed in April, followed by a fourth payment of **€3.05 billion** in August and fifth payment of **€1.8 billion** in November. **The support remains conditional** on the fulfilment of agreed requirements linked to:

- essentials such as macro-financial stability, budget oversight, and public financial management
- sectoral and structural reforms and investments (necessary for the EU accession).

As part of the process of preparation of the Plan by the Ukrainian government, social partners, civil society organisations and the Ukrainian Parliament (the Verkhovna Rada) were consulted, in accordance with the principle of multi-level governance.

The Ukraine Plan was [positively assessed by the Commission](#), and in May 2024 the Council [adopted an implementing decision giving a positive assessment to the Ukraine Plan](#).

A **precondition** for the support to Ukraine under the Facility is that Ukraine continues **to uphold and respect effective democratic mechanisms**, including a multi-party parliamentary system and the rule of law, and to guarantee respect for human rights, including the rights of persons belonging to minorities.

An **exceptional bridge financing** for a total amount of **€ 6 billion** was disbursed to Ukraine in March and April 2024, to support the urgent needs and ensure the macro-financial stability of the country. The payment was subject to the policy conditions agreed in a Memorandum of Understanding between the Commission and Ukraine.

The Ukraine Facility Scoreboard at the bottom of the page displays the progress in the implementation of the Ukraine Plan, including the steps fulfilled and the amounts disbursed.

Pillar II: Ukraine Investment Framework

Pillar II consists of a 'Ukraine investment framework', equipped with a reinforced budget of €9.5 billion, designed to attract and mobilise public and private investments for Ukraine's recovery and reconstruction, in support of the Ukraine Plan's implementation. It will cover risks for operations aiming at supporting sovereign, sub-sovereign,

non-commercial and commercial entities, and the private sector:

- loans, including local currency loans
- guarantees
- counter-guarantees
- capital market instruments any other form of funding or credit enhancement
- insurance
- equity or quasi-equity participation

Building on the results of the [EU-Ukraine Investment Conference](#), the EU has already committed up to €6.9 billion of these guarantee and grant agreements to attract private sector investments to support Ukraine's recovery. This represents 73% of the Framework's overall available funding for 2024-2027.

Pillar III: Union accession assistance and related support measures

This pillar, amounting to **€4.76 billion**, focuses on providing **technical assistance and support measures** to facilitate Ukraine's **alignment with EU laws** and regulations. It includes:

- Capacity-building initiatives, including **social partners**, **civil society** organisations, as well as **local and regional authorities**.
- Assistance to Ukraine in implementing the reforms necessary for EU accession and to ensure the effective utilisation of financial assistance.
- Support for other initiatives aimed at responding to the Russian aggression against Ukraine, including to enforce international law in relation with crimes committed by Russia on the territory of Ukraine.
- Interest rate subsidies for the cost of loans provided by the Ukraine Facility or previous macro-financial assistance instrument.

Summary

The common agricultural policy (CAP) is about food, the environment and the countryside. The CAP is a partnership between society and agriculture that ensures a stable supply of food, safeguards farmers' income, protects the environment and keeps rural areas vibrant.

Priorities

Launched in 1962, the EU's common agricultural policy (CAP) is a partnership between agriculture and society, and between Europe and its farmers. It aims to:

- support farmers and improve agricultural productivity, ensuring a stable supply of affordable food;
- safeguard European Union farmers to make a reasonable living;
- help tackle climate change and the sustainable management of natural resources;
- maintain rural areas and landscapes across the EU;
- keep the rural economy alive by promoting jobs in farming, agri-food industries and associated sectors.

The CAP is a common policy for all EU countries. It is managed and funded at European level from the resources of the EU's budget.

CAP 2023-27

To consolidate the role of European agriculture for the future, the CAP has evolved over the years to meet changing economic circumstances and citizens' requirements and needs.

The CAP 2023-27 entered into force on 1 January 2023. Support for farmers and rural stakeholders across the 27 EU countries is based on the CAP 2023-27 legal framework and the choices detailed in the CAP Strategic Plans, approved by the Commission. The approved Plans are designed to make a significant contribution to the ambitions of the European Green Deal, Farm to Fork Strategy and Biodiversity Strategy.

The CAP in practice

Farming is unlike most other businesses, as the following special considerations apply:

- despite the importance of food production, farmers' income is around 40% lower compared to non-agricultural income;
- agriculture depends more on the weather and the climate than many other sectors;
- there is an inevitable time gap between consumer demand and farmers being able to supply – growing more wheat or producing more milk inevitably takes time.

While being cost-effective, farmers should work in a sustainable and environmentally friendly manner, and maintain our soils and biodiversity.

Business uncertainties and the environmental impact of farming justify the significant role that the public sector plays for our farmers. The CAP takes action with the following measures:

- income support through direct payments ensures income stability, and remunerates farmers for environmentally friendly farming and delivering public services not normally paid for by the markets, such as taking care of the countryside;
- market measures to deal with difficult market situations such as a sudden drop in demand due to a health scare, or a fall in prices as a result of a temporary oversupply on the market;
- rural development measures with national and regional programmes to address the specific needs and challenges facing rural areas.

The CAP defines the conditions that will allow farmers to fulfil their functions in society in the following ways:

Food production

- There are around 10 million farms in the EU and 22 million people work regularly in the sector. They provide an impressive variety of abundant, affordable, safe and good quality products.
- The EU is known throughout the world for its food and culinary traditions and is one of the world's leading producers and net exporters of agri-food products. Due to its exceptional agricultural resources the EU could and


should play a key role in ensuring food security for the world at large.

Rural community development

- Within our countryside and its precious natural resources, there are many jobs linked to farming. Farmers need machinery, buildings, fuel, fertilisers and healthcare for their animals, also known as 'upstream' sectors.
- Other people are busy in 'downstream' operations – such as preparing, processing, and packaging food, as well as in food storage, transport and retail. The farming and food sectors together provide nearly 40 million jobs in the EU.
- To operate efficiently and remain modern and productive, farmers, upstream and downstream sectors need ready access to the latest information on agricultural issues, farming methods and market developments. During the period 2014-20, the resources of the CAP were directed towards providing high-speed technologies, improved internet services and infrastructure to 18 million rural citizens – the equivalent of 6.4% of the EU's rural population.

Environmentally sustainable farming

- Farmers have a double challenge – to produce food whilst simultaneously protecting nature and safeguarding biodiversity. Using natural resources prudently is essential for our food production and for our quality of life – today, tomorrow and for future generations.

Summary

The European Commission co-funds campaigns to promote European agricultural products worldwide and raise the profile of EU agricultural products in new markets.

Priorities

The EU Agricultural Product Promotion Policy (AGRIP) has the general objective of **improving the competitiveness of the Union's agricultural sector**. Specifically, the information and promotion measures are intended to:

- Increase awareness and recognition of Union quality schemes, as well as consumer awareness of the benefits of Union agricultural products and production methods;
- Increase the competitiveness and consumption of the Union's agricultural products, improving their visibility and increasing their market share.

There are two types of promotion:

- Actions organized by European trade or inter-trade organizations and co-financed by the EU
- Actions organized by the EU itself, e.g. diplomatic efforts by the responsible Commissioner in non-EU countries to develop agricultural trade, participation in trade fairs and communication campaigns for EU agricultural products.

The rules for promotion policy define the way in which EU funds can be used for information and promotion activities in EU member countries and countries outside the EU.

The annual work programs contribute to the implementation of the European Commission's policy priorities for the period 2019-2024, in particular the ['From farm to fork' strategy](#).

The fund helps achieve sustainable fisheries and conserve marine biological resources. This leads to

- food security through the supply of seafood products
- growth of a sustainable blue economy

The LIFE program is one of the key contributors to the [European Green Deal](#), which aims to transform the EU into a just and prosperous society with a modern, resource-

efficient and competitive economy where there are no net greenhouse gas emissions in 2050 and where economic growth is decoupled from resource use.

Priorities

The general objective of the LIFE Programme shall be to contribute to the shift towards a sustainable, circular, energy-efficient, renewable energy-based, climate-neutral and -resilient economy, in order to protect, restore and improve the quality of the environment, including the air, water and soil, and to halt and reverse biodiversity loss and to tackle the degradation of ecosystems, including by supporting the implementation and management of the [Natura 2000 network](#), thereby contributing to sustainable development. The LIFE Programme shall also support the implementation of general action programmes adopted in accordance with Article 192(3) TFEU.


Specific objectives of the LIFE Programme are:

Summary

The Nature and Biodiversity sub-program aims to **protect and restore European nature and to halt and reverse the loss of biodiversity**. Therefore, the LIFE-Nature and Biodiversity subprogram will continue to fund nature conservation projects, especially in the areas of biodiversity, habitats and species. It will support projects that contribute to the implementation of the EU [Birds](#) and [Habitats](#) Directives, and in particular to the development and management of the [Natura 2000 network](#) and the [IAS Regulation](#), and it will support the achievement of the objectives of the [EU Biodiversity Strategy to 2030](#), which is part of the [European Green Deal](#).

The Nature and Biodiversity sub-program aims to:

- Develop, demonstrate, promote and stimulate the **dissemination of innovative techniques, methods and approaches** (including nature-based solutions and ecosystem approaches) to achieve the objectives set out

in the Union's nature and biodiversity legislation and policy, and contribute to the knowledge base and application of best practices, including through support to the Natura 2000 network;

- Support the development, implementation, monitoring and **enforcement of relevant Union legislation and policy related to nature and biodiversity**, including by improving governance at all levels, in particular by strengthening the capacity of public and private actors and engaging civil society, taking also due account of the potential contributions of citizen science;
- Catalysing the **large-scale adoption of successful solutions/approaches** to the implementation of relevant nature and biodiversity legislation and Union policy through replication of results, mainstreaming of related objectives into other policy areas and public and private sector practices, mobilizing investment, and improving access to finance.

Priorities

The Nature and Biodiversity Sub-Program will be implemented primarily through the following types of actions:

- A continuation of the traditional **bottom-up approach** of implementing practical and effective actions to improve the conservation status of species and habitats, ecosystem health, and related services through the co-

financing of **Standard Action Projects (SAPs)**. All SAPs should be designed to achieve tangible improvements to species, habitats, ecosystems, and related services as a direct result of their implementation, to be defined based on specific and measurable (SMART) objectives. The general focus of the SAPs is on the following: (1) area-based conservation and restoration actions ('Space for Nature') and (2) additional specific actions for species and

ecosystems/habitats with measures other than area-based ('Protect/Safeguard Our Species and Habitats');

- A continuation of the **integrated approach** to support the full implementation of national or regional **Prioritized Action Frameworks (PAFs)** and other EU biodiversity policy planning tools through **Strategic Nature Projects (SNAPs)**. SNAPs include capacity building and mainstreaming activities, including through mobilizing

other funding sources for nature and biodiversity. SNAPs may also include specific conservation actions, especially when these cannot be supported by mobilizing additional funding from other EU funding programs;

- A structured approach to support the implementation of specific policy priorities through **specific calls for proposals under Other Actions (OAs)**;
- **Technical Assistance (TA)** projects.

Summary

The Circular Economy and Quality of Life subprogram aims to facilitate the transition to a sustainable, circular, toxin-free, energy-efficient, and climate-resilient economy and to protect, restore, and enhance environmental quality, either through direct interventions or by supporting the integration of these goals into other policies.

The specific objectives of the Circular Economy and Quality of Life subprogram are:

- Develop, demonstrate, and promote innovative techniques, methods, and approaches to **achieve the objectives of Union environmental law and policy**, and contribute to the knowledge base and, where appropriate, the application of best practices;

- Support the development, implementation, monitoring, and **enforcement of relevant Union environmental law and policy**, including by improving governance at all levels, particularly through capacity building of public and private stakeholders and the involvement of civil society;
- Catalysing the **large-scale adoption of successful technical and policy solutions** for the implementation of relevant Union environmental law and policy through replication of results, integration of related objectives into other policy areas and public and private sector practices, mobilization of investment, and improvement of access to finance. •

Priorities

The program will contribute to relevant European Union priorities by:

- Reducing resource consumption** and facilitating the transition to a sustainable, circular, toxic-free, energy-efficient and climate-resilient environment;
- Developing circular systems** in line with the new [Circular Economy Action Plan](#), which focuses on sustainable products, material- and energy-intensive sectors, and circular business models to preserve value. Projects from EU outermost regions and islands will be given special consideration;

- Reduce waste generation** in line with the [Waste Framework Directive](#) and reduce hazardous waste in view of the EU's commitment under the [Basel Convention](#);
- Improving waste management** in terms of waste collection and storage, recovery options and end-of-life disposal, including on islands, in remote coastal or land areas and in outermost regions where waste management faces particular challenges;
- Reduce emissions of pollutants** to air and seas and ensure clean air and seas for EU citizens in line with the EU acquis and the objectives of the [Pollution Action Plan](#);

- Achieve and maintain good status of the **Union's water bodies**;
- Ensure **clean surface and groundwater** in sufficient quantity for humans and other species, including through more efficient water use;
- **Reducing the production, use, and emissions of hazardous chemicals** and reducing human and environmental exposure to them;
- Promoting the development, commercialization, and adoption of **safe and sustainable substances, materials and products**;
- **Reducing exposure to harmful noise levels**;
- Protecting the **quality of EU soils**, preventing soil degradation, and increasing the resilience of soils to climate threats and combating desertification through sustainable soil and land management practices; remediating soil pollution and increasing the capacity to improve water quality by reducing nitrate leaching and reducing emissions through carbon sequestration; and preventing and mitigating soil sealing.

Summary

The Climate Change Mitigation and Adaptation sub-programme will contribute to the shift towards a sustainable, energy-efficient, renewable energy-based, climate-neutral and resilient economy, thereby contributing to sustainable development.

The specific objectives of the sub-programme "Climate Change Mitigation and Adaptation" are:

- To develop, demonstrate and promote innovative techniques, methods and approaches for **reaching the objectives of Union legislation and policy on climate action** and to contribute to the knowledge base and to the application of best practices;

- To support the development, implementation, monitoring and **enforcement of relevant Union legislation and policy on climate action**, including by improving governance at all levels, in particular through enhancing capacities of public and private actors and the involvement of civil society;
- To **catalyse the large-scale deployment of successful technical and policy-related solutions** for implementing relevant Union legislation and policy on climate action by replicating results, integrating related objectives into other policies and into public and private sector practices, mobilising investment and improving access to finance. •

Priorities

Climate Change Mitigation

- Reduction of greenhouse gas emissions, including fluorinated greenhouse gases and ozone depleting substances, in line with the EU's climate neutrality target and the improvement of energy efficiency, including addressing the policy and market framework for the development and deployment of low-carbon or energy efficient products and services, as well as by promoting the transition of the transport sector;
- Enhancing the functioning of the [Emissions Trading System](#);

- Support to sustainable land, forest, soil, sea and ocean management practices, which reduce emissions or remove CO2 from the atmosphere;
- Develop and promote solutions to remove/sequester CO2 from the atmosphere. Carbon capture and carbon removals can be nature-based and coupled with restoration projects or rely on storage in specific long-term media or use of long-lasting products.

Climate Change Adaptation

- Support adaptation related policy development, and improve adaptation strategies and plans at all levels and

in all sectors, in line with the new EU Strategy on Adaptation to Climate Change;

- Improve, promote, and scale up the use of state-of-the art tools and solutions for adaptation modelling, risk assessment, management and decision support; adaptation monitoring, reporting and evaluation; and ex-ante project assessment tools to better identify co-benefits and positive impacts on the economy of adaptation and prevention projects;
- Support the rollout of viable nature-based solutions in the management of land, coastal and marine areas including through assessments, guidance, capacity building, and suitable financial approaches and products;
- Approaches and solutions for adapting cities and regions to climate change, notably in support of the EU and Global [Covenant of Mayors](#) and of the [European Climate Pact](#);
- Approaches and solutions to ensure a stable and secure supply of high quality freshwater, prevent droughts, reduce water use, protect and restore wetlands, and prevent floods;
- Solutions to climate-proof and enhance the resilience of infrastructure and buildings, including by using blue-green infrastructure and through cooperation with standardisation organisations;
- Support preparedness for extreme weather events, notably at a local level and in the outermost regions;
- Promote financial instruments and innovative solutions to deal with climate-induced risks, and public-private

collaboration to reduce the share of uninsured climate-related economic losses, including by improving collection and access to climate-related economic loss data.

Climate Change Governance and Information, which will include actions contributing to climate change mitigation or adaptation

- Incentivise changes in behaviour and practices, as well as improving citizens' knowledge and awareness, notably through the support of the implementation of the European Climate Pact, mainstreaming emission reduction and resource efficiency actions in relevant sectors;
- Development and implementation of climate and energy strategies or mid-century strategies at local, regional and national level;
- Improve greenhouse gas monitoring, accounting and reporting and contribute to policy monitoring, assessment and ex-post evaluation;
- Information on best practices and awareness raising on climate change mitigation and adaptation, including on climate-proofing of infrastructure investment and policies;
- Development of climate services and promotion of climate science;
- Development and promotion of sustainable finance instruments and support for climate diplomacy.

Summary

Building on the success of the Intelligent Energy Europe (2003-2013) and Horizon 2020 Energy Efficiency (2014-2020) programmes, the LIFE Clean Energy Transition sub-programme continues to support the delivery of EU policies in the field of sustainable energy, in particular, the [European Green Deal](#), the [Energy Union](#) (2030 energy and climate targets) and the [European Union's 2050 long-term decarbonisation strategy](#).

The sub-programme will aim at facilitating the **transition toward an energy-efficient, renewable energy-based, climate-neutral and -resilient economy** by funding coordination and support actions across Europe. These actions aim at breaking market barriers that hamper the socio-economic transition to sustainable energy, typically engaging multiple small and medium-size stakeholders,

multiple actors including local and regional public authorities and non-profit organisations, and involving consumers.

The sub-programme will contribute to the implementation of the energy-related actions of the European Green Deal, including the '[Renovation wave](#)' initiative for the building sector and will give due consideration to territories not connected to the European grids such as the EU outermost regions. It will contribute to the Just Transition objectives by accompanying the territories and the groups of citizens negatively affected by the transition from fossil fuels to clean energy, by building capacity of actors and fostering clean energy investments, in energy efficiency and locally available, sustainable, renewable energy sources. Activities related to technology development will not be included..

Priorities

The specific objectives of the sub-programme „Clean Energy Transition“ are the following:

- To develop, demonstrate and promote **innovative techniques, methods and approaches for reaching the objectives of Union legislation and policy** on the transition to sustainable renewable energy and increased energy efficiency, and to contribute to the knowledge base and to the application of best practice;
- To support the development, implementation, monitoring and enforcement of **relevant Union**

legislation and policy on the transition to sustainable renewable energy or increased energy efficiency, including by improving governance at all levels, in particular through enhancing capacities of public and private actors and the involvement of civil society;

- To catalyse the **large-scale deployment of successful technical and policy-related solutions** for implementing relevant Union legislation on the transition to renewable energy or increased energy efficiency by replicating results, integrating related objectives into other policies

and into public and private sector practices, mobilising investment and improving access to finance.



Other activities related to energy efficiency and renewable energy, which do not address the specific requirements of the calls defined

under this sub-programme can be submitted to the calls under the Climate Change Mitigation and Adaptation sub-programme.

A significant part of this budget will be used to finance Coordination and Support Actions (CSA) under OAs grants for the four year period, whereas the possibility to finance SAPs is only foreseen as from 2023.

Summary

The Innovation Fund is one of the world's largest **funding programmes for the demonstration of innovative low-carbon technologies**. The Innovation Fund provides grants for projects aiming at the commercial deployment of

innovative low-carbon technologies. The aim is to bring industrial solutions to market to decarbonise Europe and support its transition to climate neutrality.

Priorities

The Innovation Fund supports large and small projects that focus on:

- Innovative low-carbon technologies and processes in energy-intensive industries, including products that replace carbon-intensive industries
- Carbon capture and utilisation (CCU).
- Construction and operation of carbon capture and storage (CCS)
- Innovative renewable energy generation
- Energy storage

Projects funded under this programme are expected to contribute to the transition to a climate neutral economy by 2050 and to the achievement of the target to reduce emissions by at least 55% by 2030 as set out in the [European Climate Change Act](#) and the [European Green Deal](#), as well as to the achievement of the targets set out in the [REPowerEU Plan](#) for Renewable Energy, Energy Efficiency and Renewable Hydrogen.

The Innovation Fund focuses on highly **innovative technologies and large-scale flagship projects** in Europe that can deliver significant emission reductions. It is about sharing the risk with project promoters to support the demonstration of highly innovative projects that are unique in their kind.

The aim is to fund a diverse project pipeline that strikes an optimal balance between a broad range of innovative technologies in all eligible sectors and Member States, Norway and Iceland.

At the same time, projects must be sufficiently mature in terms of planning, business model and financial and legal structure.

The Fund supports cross-cutting projects on innovative low-carbon solutions that lead to emission reductions in several sectors, for example through industrial symbiosis.

Multiannual Financial Framework - Heading: Natural Resources & Environment Cluster: Environment & Climate Action

Summary

The Just Transition Mechanism (JTM) is a key tool to ensure that the transition towards a climate-neutral economy happens in a fair way, leaving no one behind. It provides targeted support to help mobilise around €55 billion over the period 2021-2027 in the most affected regions, to alleviate the socio-economic impact of the transition.

The JTM is part of the European Green Deal Investment Plan, to make sure that no one and no region is left behind in the transition to a climate-neutral economy. It provides support to the most negatively affected regions and helps them to alleviate the socio-economic costs of the transition.

Priorities

The Just Transition Mechanism [addresses the social and economic effects of the transition](#), focusing on the regions, industries and workers who will face the greatest challenges, through three pillars:

- **A new Just Transition Fund** of €19.7 billion in current prices, is expected to mobilise around €7.3 billion of national co-financing, amounting to a total of €27 billion.
- **InvestEU "Just Transition" scheme** will provide a budgetary guarantee under the InvestEU programme across the four policy windows and an InvestEU Advisory Hub that will act as a central entry point for advisory support requests. It is expected to mobilise €10-15 billion in mostly private sector investments.
- **A new Public Sector Loan Facility** will combine €1.3 billion of grants financed from the EU budget with €6-8 billion of loans from the European Investment Bank, to mobilise €13.3-15.3 billion of public investment.

Territorial just transition plans define the territories in which the [Just Transition Fund](#) will be used. The identification of

these territories is carried out through a dialogue with the Commission. These plans set out the challenges in each territory, as well as the development needs and objectives to be met by 2030. They identify the types of operations envisaged and specify governance mechanisms. The approval of the territorial just transition plans opens the doors to dedicated financing under the other two pillars of the Just Transition Mechanism.

The Just Transition Platform assists EU countries and regions with the just transition. It consists of a single access point and helpdesk. It provides comprehensive technical and advisory support. Authorities and beneficiaries can access it to find all they need to know about the funds, including opportunities, relevant regulatory updates or sector specific initiatives. The Platform also promotes actively the exchange of best practices among all stakeholders involved, including through regular physical and virtual gatherings.

The third pillar of the JTM is a blending facility called Public Sector Loan Facility (JTM PSLF).

This facility aims to address serious social, economic and environmental challenges deriving from the transition towards the EU's 2030 climate and energy targets and the EU's 2050 objective of climate neutrality as set out in the European Climate Law Regulation [2021/1119](#), for the benefit of the EU territories identified in the [Territorial Just Transition Plans](#) established in accordance with Article 11 of Regulation [2021/1056](#).

In this context, the PSLF intends to increase public sector investments which address the development needs of the territories identified in the Territorial Just Transition Plans, by facilitating the financing of projects that do not generate sufficient streams of revenues to cover their investment costs.

Support will be available to all Member States, focused on regions that are the most carbon-intensive or with the most people working in fossil fuels. Member States can get access by preparing territorial just transition plans that cover the period up to 2030, identifying the territories that should get the most support. The plans should also set out ways to best address social, economic and environmental challenges.

- **People and citizens**, most vulnerable to the transition

The Just Transition Mechanism will protect them by

- facilitating employment opportunities in new sectors and those in transition
- offering re-skilling opportunities

- improving energy-efficient housing
- investing to fight energy poverty
- facilitating access to clean, affordable and secure energy

- **Companies and sectors**, active in or comprising carbon-intensive industries

The Just Transition Mechanism will protect them by

- supporting the transition to low-carbon technologies and economic diversification based on climate-resilient investments and jobs
- creating attractive conditions for public and private investors
- providing easier access to loans and financial support
- investing in the creation of new firms, SMEs and start-ups
- investing in research and innovation activities

- **Member States and regions**, with high dependence on fossil fuel and carbon-intensive industries

The Just Transition Mechanism will protect them by

- supporting the transition to low-carbon and climate-resilient activities
- creating new jobs in the green economy
- investing in public and sustainable transport
- providing technical assistance
- investing in renewable energy sources
- improving digital connectivity
- providing affordable loans to local public authorities
- improving energy infrastructure, district heating and transportation networks.

Multiannual Financial Framework - Heading: Migration & Border Management Cluster: Migration

Summary

The AMIF aims to further develop national capacities and improve migration management procedures, as well as strengthen solidarity and responsibility sharing between Member States, in particular through emergency assistance and the resettlement mechanism.

AMIF will contribute to the achievement of **four specific objectives**:

- Strengthen and further develop all aspects of the **Common European Asylum System**, including its external dimension;

- Support **legal immigration** to Member States, including by contributing to the integration of third-country nationals;
- Contribute to the **fight against irregular migration** and ensuring effective return and readmission to third countries;
- **Strengthen solidarity** and responsibility-sharing among Member States, in particular towards those most affected by migration and asylum challenges.

Priorities

Actions financed by the AMIF can cover a wide range of initiatives, such as:

- Ensure uniform application of the **EU acquis (common rulebook)** and priorities related to the Common European Asylum System, legal migration and return;
- Provide **support and services** appropriate to the status and needs of the person concerned, in particular vulnerable groups;
- Support the **resettlement, humanitarian admission and transfer of persons** who have applied for or been granted international protection;
- Support the development and implementation of measures to **promote legal migration**, such as developing EU mobility programs and raising awareness of appropriate legal immigration channels;

- Support **integration measures** tailored to the needs of third-country nationals and early integration programs that focus on education, language, and other training (such as civic orientation courses and career counselling) to prepare for their active participation in and acceptance by the host society;
- Support **infrastructures for the reception of third-country nationals**, including the possible sharing of such facilities by more than one Member State;
- Support an **integrated and coordinated approach** to return management at EU and Member State level, building capacity for effective and sustainable return and reducing incentives for irregular migration;
- Support **assisted voluntary return and reintegration**;

- **Cooperation with third countries** in the areas of asylum, legal migration and the fight against irregular migration, as well as in effective return and readmission for the purpose of migration management.

Summary

The Directorate-General for Communication of the European Parliament (EP) awards grants in the field of communication to raise public awareness of the role of the European Parliament in our lives, promote democracy and increase civic participation.

The objectives of the EP communication grant programme are fully aligned with the EP institutional communication strategy. The EP communication strategy aims notably to emphasise how decisions taken by the European Parliament have a strong impact on the lives of citizens and that they are legitimate because they are the result of a fully democratic process.

Democratic process and democratic engagement are the foundation of the European Parliament. European elections are a key moment in the democratic life of the European Union (EU) and the results of voting, be it at local, regional, national, or European level, impact the lives of Europeans in profound ways.

However, democratic engagement goes beyond just elections: it is about understanding what is at stake well enough to make informed decisions. It is also about making one's voice heard beyond the act of voting; it is about spreading the word and helping raise awareness about issues that concern us and our future. The freedom to do all this exists only in a democracy. It is up to each and every citizen to ensure that this is maintained; and it is up to the European Parliament to help them do so.

In order to foster the democratic process and democratic engagement, the EP relies on several key channels of "strategic engagement". This refers to the engagement of the EP with stakeholders in order to work with them to accomplish a specific goal. This means helping them understand and communicate what the European Parliament is, what it does and what it stands for.

Priorities

For the purpose of the grants programme, the channels of specific engagement are notably the media (including digital players and online platforms), public and private stakeholders – from Civil Society Organisations (including youth and cultural) to Non-Governmental Organisations (NGOs), general interests groups, think tanks, business umbrella organisations, professional associations, trade unions – and citizens. For this purpose, these key stakeholders should be able to access EP funding to implement their communication actions on the role and

activities of the EP and ultimately to foster the European democratic process and engagement.

Therefore, the principal objective of the grants programme can be defined as follows: to contribute to raise citizens' awareness of the role and democratic values of the EP by promoting strategic engagement with media and other key public and private stakeholders.

The expected result of the programme is to increase the reach towards targeted audiences more effectively with messages related to the work of the European Parliament, to

add legitimacy to EP campaigns and reinforce the importance of citizen involvement and representation in European decision-making.

The key performance indicator to measure the achievement of the principal objective of the grants programme is the number of communication actions co-financed and the hours of attention generated by the co-financed actions.

Summary

Pilot projects and preparatory actions (PPPAs) are **new initiatives that might turn into EU funding programmes**. Pilot projects are designed to test the feasibility of an action, and last not more than 2 years. Preparatory actions last for

up to 3 years, and are often the successor of a successful pilot project. They are designed to **prepare new EU policies, legislation, programmes** etc.

Priorities

EACEA manages PPPAs in the areas of **sport, culture and media**.

Actions will focus on **encouraging community integration of children and youth**. By improving their mental well-being by attending sport sessions, these individuals will eventually become ready to adjust to their new environment. Sport activities, with their power of bringing people together, will help interaction with the host community; facilitate integration into the education system and the labour market.

Additionally, actions may focus on **examples of inspirational behaviour and practices at grassroots level** that can be multiplied and on methods to engage citizens and sport stakeholders in communities to co-create and cooperate on sustainable sport practices

Other actions work on pooling voices, forces and resources – both public and private - for the **benefit of a holistic and integrated approach to cultural heritage policies** at all levels, notably at the EU level, and ensure that all relevant EU and national policies and priorities duly incorporate a cultural heritage dimension, as explained in the abovementioned Annual Work Programme for 2022. In pursuing this objective, the Hub will build on and pool the resources of the data space for cultural heritage, based in Europe and in the 15-years work of over 4000 museums, libraries and archives across Europe, including Ukraine and the Balkans as well as the upcoming Competence Centre for the conservation of cultural heritage (which is also leading an initiative called SUM (Save the Ukraine Monuments)).
